

BEAVER'S TURN NEXT

The Conviction of Machen Not Encouraging to Beavers

He Would Not Stand Trial but Went Out of the Jurisdiction of the Grand Jury

Washington, D. C., March 7.—With the conviction of the Machen crowd public interest in the post office frauds will now turn to the case of George W. Beavers, indicted in Brooklyn and in Washington for conspiracy in the postal frauds. The case came up for argument in the supreme court today on an appeal from the decision of the United States Commissioner and the judge of the circuit. Beavers must go to Brooklyn to stand trial. If the supreme court decides that Beavers must face the indictments which have been waiting for him in Brooklyn since last fall, it will be for the prosecution to decide what will become of the indictments in Washington. These have been holding back for the decision on the Brooklyn indictments.

Beavers, who was superintendent of the salaries and allowance division with headquarters at Washington, resigned when the investigation of post-office frauds first began. He was not drawn into it directly, although his name was mentioned in connection with the various shady transactions, until the inspectors got after E. J. Brandt-Dent & Company, which had sold change-making machines worth thousands of dollars to the post-office department. These were of no use to the clerks, and had been thrown aside in nearly every instance. Working on this line the inspectors found that when Edmund H. Driggs of Brooklyn was congressman he had dealings with Beavers and the Brandt-Dent Company. Checks, bankbooks and other testimony before the grand jury in Brooklyn last summer resulted in several indictments for Beavers, Driggs and the Brandt-Dent people. Joint indictments of Beavers and Driggs were quashed on technicalities, but others resulted, on which Driggs recently served a nominal day in prison and paid a fine of \$10,000. Beavers would not stand trial. Before he was indicted he went to Manhattan, out of the jurisdiction of the grand jury which indicted him. He has stayed outside of that federal jurisdiction ever since, and has fought by every possible means any legal steps to compel him to stand trial in Brooklyn, where he would have to undergo preliminary examination before a commissioner, thus disclosing part of his defence.

County Court Business.

Friday and Saturday the county court completed its business, and adjourned for the term. The following orders and rulings were made:

The petition of W. L. and others for a road running from Woodburn to Hubbard, following the S. P. right-of-way was allowed, and the board of county road viewers, consisting of the county surveyor, B. J. Grim and G. Simmons, has been appointed to view the road at an early date.

The petition of J. Ulrich Miller and others for a county road, was continued until the next term of the court. The petitions of D. A. Magnus and others, and C. Zimmerman and others for new county roads were disallowed. A warrant of \$50 was ordered drawn, payable to Jos Etzel, in aid of opening county road petitioned for by Joseph Etzel and others.

The tax on the bank stock of the Cooper estate, for 1903, was remitted, on account of a recent law, as such stock was not properly assessed.

Lawrence Gooding and wife deeded to the county a road way between Fairfeld and St. Paul. Acceptance was postponed until investigation could be made.

The Eastern Investment Co. made application for a refund of money paid erroneously on taxes. The payment was made as requested.

Joseph Boschler and others petitioned the court for aid in cutting down and graveling the Boschler and Miller hills on the Mt. Angel and Woodburn road. Continued.

J. H. Fryer was appointed supervisor of the road district at Shaw. J. A. Dickinson, resigned.

Wicked County.

If Fayette county, in the southern part of West Virginia, is not the wickedest county in the United States, the one which surpasses it has yet to be heard from, says the Cincinnati Enquirer.

To begin with, the judge of the criminal court was under indictment for embezzlement at the time of his election, is still under indictment and a special judge will have to sit at his trial in his own court.

The president of the county court, which has sole power to grant or refuse licenses to sell liquors in the county, is the principal owner of the county, and every saloon which secures licenses in the county buys its supplies from this wholesale house.

The sheriff of the county is a bar-keeper, has been one for twenty years and has been convicted several times since he has occupied the office of sheriff for illegal liquor selling.

A justice of the piece in the county ran away with a woman and was married to her at Cincinnati. It developed that he had another wife living and his indictment for bigamy followed.

A man who had been constable for thirty years and one of the best officials in the county, shot and killed another man for talking to the constable's wife, and he is serving a term of eighteen years in the penitentiary for it.

The son of a former judge of the criminal court was tried by his father's successor for murder.

The grand jury which has just adjourned returned fourteen indictments for murder and there are sixteen indictments on the docket for trial for murder at the present term of court.

The grand jury before the present one returned twelve indictments for murder.

Fifteen murders were committed within the county during Christmas week.

The jail contains so many prisoners that tramps arrested for riding on trains are turned away from the jail

when brought in, for the reason that there is no room for them.

There are 55 counties in West Virginia, yet almost one fifth of the inmates of the penitentiary were sent there from Fayette county.

With a population of less than 33,000 the county has a debt of almost \$100,000.

Out of the 9,000 voters in the county over 6,000 were last year returned delinquent for the non-payment of taxes.

The carrying of firearms is so prevalent in the county that the judge of the criminal court has had to issue a proclamation, warning the public that he will give every person convicted of carrying firearms a fine of \$2000 and a sentence of one year in jail.
