What she has done is nothing to what she will attempt, yet sober-minded men may well doubt her ability to carry out her St. Patrick day designs. YET ONE SURVIVES.

The statement that Mrs. Rebecca Mayo, aged 90, and the last but one of the surviving widows of a Revolutionary war soldier, has just died, furnishes food for reflection. It is a hundred and twenty years since that war closed, yet there is still living a widow of one who fought for our independence. Her husband battled against England, when all the colonies possessed but little more population than the city of New York today. True, the widow was not born until the war had been over for thirty years, and it was undoubtedly a case where a young woman became an old man's darling. Her husband, to have taken part even in the last year of the war, must have been born not later than 1770, which would have put him in the army at the age of 13. Consequently, placing the widow's age at 90, he was 44 years of age when she was born, and if married at 16 he was then 60. From the time of his birth until his widow's death was not less than 124 years, and fourteen such periods would have extended back to the time of the crucifixion. Four such joint lives would reach Columbus' time, and six would bring up the scenes when Peter the Hermit started the first crusade.
