HOUGHTON GOES TO PRISON

Attempt to Escape His Sentence on a Technicality Falls in Supreme Court

In the supreme court this afternoon cases were decided as follows:
State of Oregon, respondent, vs. Charles Houghton, appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; Hon. A. L. Fraser, judge; affirmed. Opinion by Justice Bean. The defendant was twice tried for assault with intent to rob. Following the first trial he appealed, and the case was reversed. The mandate had not been received in the lower court when he was tried the second time, and when he was sentenced to the penitentiary, he appealed, alleging that the trial court had no jurisdiction. The appellate court holds he waived his right when he went to trial without raising the question then. He will have to serve his term in the penitentiary.
James Hall, respondent, vs. A. Abraham, appellant; appeal from Douglas county; B. W. Hamilton, judge;

reversed. Opinion by Wolverton. This suit was for the recovery of some ore mined on land sold under contract. The court instructed the jury to deduct the cost of mining from value of the ore. From this instruction an appeal was taken. The supreme court holds the instruction was wrong, and orders a new trial.

North Pacific Lumber Co. vs. Spore & Robinson and Hanson & Landon; appeal from Multnomah county, Fraser, judge; judgment set aside. Opinion by Moore, C. J. This case was brought for the recovery of building material. The lower court gave judgment against one firm only, and the supreme court holds that the two firms were, in effect, one organization, and the judgment should be against both.

Geo. L. Hibbard, respondent, vs. S. C. Henderson, et al., appellants; from Multnomah county; Cleland, judge; affirmed. Opinion by Moore.
Coast Land and Live Stock Co., respondent, vs. Oregon Colonization Co., appellant, and Geo. H. Selover, et al., defendants; from Benton county; Hamilton, judge; affirmed. Opinion by Bean.
