Subscribed for Nearly Two and a Half Times Over

Great Success of the Home T. D. Jorges Loan Plan Inaugurated by the People of the Capital City

The fourth popular loan made in Harvey Slater this city has been a great success. Mrs. H. M. Wandt The subscriptions amounted to \$72,-625, when only \$30,000 was called for. This indicates that the people have confidence in the Republican administration of the city, and that it is just as safe and as good a business administration as the Citizens' administration that preceded it.

So many subscribed that no bonds above \$500 will have to be issued, the city charter requiring the smallest bonds to be issued first. A New York firm offered to take the bonds at par and interest, but not a dollar will go to any syndicate, the people of Salem M. C. Smith preferring to hold their own securities, and leep the interest at home. and this is the only city in the United States that pursues this sound policy of municipal finance.

These bonds draw four per cent and interest payable in gold coin semi-annually at Salem, and it is in striking contrast with the sale of bonds of the city of Portland recently at a higher rate of interest.
