The proposed connection with Independence should be pushed with all the vigor of both communities and would add to the trade of both towns.

An electric extension to the Liberty and Rosedale neighborhood would do a profitable business as soon as established.

THE LIBERTY EXTENSION.

THE LATE DUKE OF CAMBRIDGE

His Marriage Not Legal and His Sons Cannot Inherit the Titles—His Wife an Actress

London, March 23.—The death of the Duke of Cambridge has aroused considerable speculation as to the disposition of Gloucester House, which contrary to general belief, does not belong to the crown, but was the private property of the late duke, to whom it was bequeathed by his aunt, the Duchess of Gloucester. The mansion occupies a commanding position at the corner of Park Lane and Piccadilly, and its windows look on to both of these famous thoroughfares. It is filled from cellar to garret with art treasures, including some magnificent pictures and a wonderful collection of jeweled snuff boxes, many of them dating from the eighteenth century and painted by the leading miniaturists of the day. The apartments are stately and contrast pleasantly with those of the more modern palaces of the locality. Gloucester House is one of the few great mansions of London where electric light has never been admitted, the Duke sticking fast to the old custom of using wax candles.

Gloucester House is altogether too palatial a mansion, and likewise much too costly a one to admit of its being retained by any of the Duke's sons. There are three of the latter, the offspring of the marriage of the late duke to the Dublin actress, Miss Fairbrother, who up to the time of her death was known as Mrs. Fitz-George, a name now borne by her sons. This marriage was an invalid one from a legal point of view and consequently the sons do not inherit the rank or title of their father. The late duke felt keenly the implied slight on the lady whom he honored as his wife, but was never able to take position as the duchess. Queen Victoria always had a kindly feeling for Mrs. Fitz-George, and to her children Windsor, Balmoral and Buckingham palaces were always open. King Edward has continued to share this feeling for the family of the duke of Cambridge and on more than one occasion has made it a point to signal out one of the sons for honors. Perhaps the best known of the three sons of the late duke is Col. Augustus Charles Frederick Fitz-George, who has won his way in the army by sheer ability rather than by virtue of his royal connections. He has seen nearly forty years of active service, accompanying Lord Napier to Magdala and the Prince of Wales on his Indian tour.

Celebrated Portland Vase.

Probably the most celebrated vase of ancient or modern times is the Portland vase, which, like many other things of note, has had a varied history, being broken into a dozen pieces by the blow of a madman who was visiting the British museum. Later it was repaired. One interesting phase of its history was its sale in London and the securing of a copy by Wedgwood. It was while the potter was at the height of his fame that this Berberini vase was offered for sale.

The vase is supposed to have been made in the glass works of Alexander when at their best. Brought to Rome it was used as a receptacle for the ashes of the funeral pyre in the sarcophagus of the Emperor Alexander Severus. The vase was later deposited in the library of the Barberini family. Critics think the subjects of the bas-reliefs which decorate the surface to bear reference to the Elysian mysteries. It is not to be wondered that Wedgwood, who had all his life searched for the rarest types of the potters' and engravers' art,

should covet this gem of all others. He bid for it. But as the duke of Portland was his competitor it was arranged that the duke should buy the vase and lend it to Wedgwood for the purpose of copying.

The material of which this rare article is composed is thought to be of precious stone but Wedgwood found it to be of glass, the ground work of dark blue, so dark as to look black. He was restricted from molding it lest any injury should result, and it was, therefore, used as a model. Fifty copies were made of jasperware. They were considered faultless and were exhibited in all the courts of Europe, but brought the maker no more than he paid for them. As the model is still in existence copies have been made by Wedgwood's successors, but they lack the finish of the original.

Lincoln's Log Cabin.

In the search for Abraham Lincoln's log cabin birthplace it transpires that the materials of which it was constructed are stored in a building at College point, New York City. It was taken there for exhibition, and, as usual in such instances, afterwards tossed aside, when it ceased to be profitable. In the same way John Brown's "fort" at Harper's ferry was taken to Chicago and nobody knows what has become of it. Libby prison was another historic landmark torn down at Richmond and shipped to Chicago, where it was a failure for money making purposes. Its bricks are scattered to the four winds.

There are side-show iconoclasts and vandals who would tear up Washington's tomb and cart it to a fair and exhibit it if they dared. Max O'Rell, in his book on America, says an American tried to buy the Shakespeare home at Stratford to bring to this country, and that the proposition called forth great indignation in England. It quite destroys the associations and the sentimental flavor of houses and objects which, by their character, should remain immovable, to transplant them from their native soil. The Baston Elm, on the common, when it stood there, was an object of veneration, but to dig it up and carry it away thousands of miles to be looked at would have been a profanation.

Lincoln's log cabin should stand on the farm where Lincoln was born, and not be moved about the country. If its timbers are still in storage and can be proven to be genuine, they should be restored to their original

site in Kentucky. A member of the Kentucky legislature on Saturday introduced a bill to purchase the Lincoln cabin and farm for \$10,000.
