The Salem veterans recently passed a similar resolution.

The Albany school district will vote on the refunding of their bonds on April 18. The bonds at present draw 6 per cent interest, but under the new state law the state school fund can be borrowed by the districts at 5 per cent, and the interest saved will be considerable.

A. M. LaFollette Attacked and Replies

To a Correspondent of the Salem Statesman on the Hop Bill

Ed. Statesman: Hon. A. M. LaFollette is making a campaign for the primary election down here in this precinct, using as his strongest argument to prove that his crowd should win, the great work he did for the hopgrowers of Oregon in pushing the bill for a state hop inspector. This is a hopgrowing precinct and this argument is calculated to have great weight with the men who will attend the Republican primary election on Monday next.

This should have the very opposite effect, for the bill was far from being a good one. It was very bad, and would have done great damage to the hop growing interests. The fact is that hundreds of hopgrowers signed petitions and wrote letters against its passage. The fact is, further, that the hopgrowers of Oregon were almost unanimous against the passage of the bill, and it was their efforts that defeated it. It would be an excellent thing for the hopgrowers of the Brooks and Mission Bottom district to keep the LaFollette crowd out of the Marion county Republican convention.

Mr. LaFollette Replies.

Ed. Statesman: Some one in a letter printed in this morning's Statesman attacked me in regard to my action in working for a hop bill which I introduced in the last session of the legislature, signing the nom de plume "Republican."

He states that I am using this as an argument why I should be elected a delegate to the county convention. He is mistaken in his proposition. Just the opposite, I am using as an argument that a certain person who seeks to run this precinct, did defeat the bill, thereby losing to the hopgrowers two pounds of tare on every bale of hops grown in Brooks precinct, as my bill aimed to reduce the tare from seven to five pounds on every bale.

I will add that in the state of California the tare is four pounds, or two per cent, in Washington five pounds, and in New York five pounds. Then why handicap Oregon growers with seven pounds tare? At the price ruling at present my bill would have saved 50 cents on every bale of hops to the grower, thereby saving to the hopgrowers of the state of Oregon the enormous sum of \$42,000.

Your correspondent would make the people of my precinct believe that I worked against their interest, and that I got a graft. Now I have lived in this precinct forty-five years, and the people know pretty well if I am a grafter or not. I offered to cut out everything in the bill but tare. This did not seem to please the person who was so conspicuous in defeating the bill. The bill was introduced in the senate at the same time, and if I mistake not, passed without a dissenting vote, and now I think the people of Marion county know whether I worked for their interest or not, without an anonymous correspondent rushing into print. Whenever I have any grievance to make, I have the manhood to sign my name.
