Convention Notes.

Prof. G. W. Jones, of Salem No. 4, placed in nomination John W. Roland for clerk, and was ably seconded by E. W. Hazard, of Jefferson. Mr. Roland's old home, Walter L. Toose seconded in behalf of Woodburn, and E. Hofer spoke for Mr. Roland in behalf of Salem No. 7. Upon motion the clerk of the convention cast the entire vote of the convention for Mr. Roland. This was done with a hearty good will, and the nominee made a neat speech of acknowledgement.

Harrison Jones nominated John C. Siegmund in a ringing speech for that loyal young Republican. Several seconds were made, and the nomination was made by acclamation.

E. T. Moores for county superintendent and W. Y. Richardson for treasurer, were also nominated by acclamation.

Fred J. Rice was nominated for assessor and the nomination was seconded by H. C. Epley, Walter Toose, Alex. LaFollette and others.

Chas. Lembecke was nominated by his home delegation, and received liberal seconds.

Hon. E. T. Judd nominated Wm. L. Hilleary, of Turner, for the legislature in a very neat and effective speech, saying that Mr. Hilleary was a representative farmer and prominent official of the state grange. He pledged him to not vote against reform bills, and stated emphatically that his vote would never be cast against such a measure as the corporation tax law or the car shortage bill in the last legislature. Farmers had everything to lose, and nothing to gain, by shutting such men as Mr. Hilleary out of the

legislature, and sending men who would vote for legislation in the interest of the corporations.

NEWSPAPERS IN SCHOOLS.

New York Times Introduced by a Brooklyn Superintendent.

The New York Times is now being used in one of the Brooklyn schools as a part of the studies. Forty pupils, to each of whom a copy of the Times is furnished, devote about an hour a day to a discussion of the news and editorials. The developments of the war between Japan and Russia are closely followed. The district superintendent who suggested the use of the paper says:

"My idea in suggesting the reading of the New York Times as part of the school studies was simply to relieve the monotony of the routine work of the pupils. The Times is a clean, reliable paper, written in a crisp, grammatical style, and the pupils are placed in the position of being able to obtain an authentic account of the events of the day. Then the editorials are written in such a manner that even the juvenile mind can readily grasp their intent and meaning. I don't mean to show any discrimination among the newspapers, but I selected the Times because I thought it would best serve the purpose of my idea."
