Snakes Kill Thousands.

I have been reading in my morning paper the statistics of a year's mortality from the attacks of snakes and wild animals in India, and have been almost compelled to doubt the evidence of my own eyes. In the year 1902 tigers killed more than a thousand people, 65 victims falling to one man-eater in a district of Bengal. Special rewards were offered for the destruction of this vicious beast, but nobody earned them. Wolves accounted for 377 people.

These figures are unpleasant reading, but are by no means the worst the statistics have to offer. How many people who do not know India, can realize that last year alone more than 23,000 people died from snake bites, some 11,000 of these deaths coming from the Providence of Bengal, and more than 3000 of these being credited to the Pina division. The figures take one's breath away.—The Sketch.

the robbers left the car. He lighted the fuse.

The party had just reached the locomotive when the explosion occurred. Engineer Joensing is not certain that the robbers got any plunder. He was made to get up on his engine, and stay there until further orders came for him to carry the highwaymen south. His engine had been uncoupled. He knows not by whom. He complied with the order, but was not allowed even to take his fireman along.

Dared Not Look Back.

The robbers stood at his back on the trip down, their rifles pressing against his back, and he dared not look around. He says if they had any plunder he did not see it. They told him as they pulled out from the scene of the hold-up that they wanted to be carried to Keswick station, five miles south, but as they neared that point, a couple of hundred yards south of there, where a bridge spans the river, which lies just east of the track, he was ordered to stop.

When he stopped they alighted on the river side. To the west of the track at that point lies the smelter

town of Keswick. The robbers evidently wanted to convey the impression that they would cross the river on the bridge. The officers believe they made straight for Keswick.

Posse in Pursuit.

Redding Cal., April 1.—One hundred men heavily armed are scouring the woods along the river near Keswick and Redding, searching for the four train robbers. The sheriff's posse got on the trail of the three horsemen this morning, and are now following them East. The robbers encamped near Coley all day yesterday, and the officers have a good description in their possession of the robbers. The people are determined to hang the robbers if they are caught, and posses are forming hourly.

DIED.

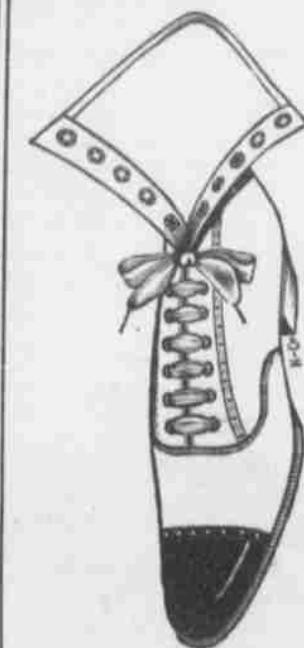
GEORGE.—At Marion, March 29, 1904, of cancer, A. B. George, aged 70 years.
