ANTI SALOON PARTY

Defeated at the Eugene City Election

But a Large Majority for the Free Public Library

Eugene, April 5.—The municipal election was one of the hardest-fought contests ever witnessed in the city, and the vote was the largest ever polled, there being 1190 votes polled in the four wards. The contest was waged by the Anti-Saloon League, on the ground of the failure of the past council to enforce laws in regard to saloons, cigar stores and gambling. The anti-saloon ticket elected W. W. Calkins as councilman in the first ward, while in the other three wards the Citizens' ticket was successful, electing R. B. Henderson in the second ward, George B. Dorris in the third, and J. D. Matlock in the fourth. B. F. Dorris, for recorder, and Frank Reiser, for treasurer, had no opposition.

A special vote was also taken of an advisory nature on the question of whether the city should accept the library gift from Andrew Carnegie of \$10,000, on the ground of the city assuming a perpetual annual expense of \$1000 for its maintenance, and this carried by a large majority.

There was much argument about the polling places, and one occurrence has been the subject of much talk. It was an altercation about noon between Rev. B. F. Rowland, of the Methodist Episcopal church, and J. D. Matlock, candidate for re-election as councilman from the fourth ward. The discussion became heated and Rev. Rowland accused Matlock of having taken an official oath to enforce the laws of the city without ever any intention of doing so. This was vigorously denied by Matlock, when, according to bystanders, the lie was passed by Rev. Rowland, and Matlock struck him a blow in the face. Others then interfered, and prevented any further melee.

The fight of the day was waged mostly against Matlock and Dorris, both of whom were elected after a vigorous effort, Matlock by 26 majority and Dorris by 49.

ARBITRATION INTRODUCED IN DENMARK AND NEW SOUTH WALES

United States Consul Frazier, at Copenhagen, reports: There is no permanent arbitration court in Denmark. The lockout of 1899, affecting 40,000 workmen and which caused great suffering, was settled as a result of a proposition drawn up and submitted by three prominent citizens of Copenhagen, who volunteered their services to employers and employees, and who, because of their high standing in the community and the universal confidence imposed in them, were accepted by both elements to the controversy as arbitrators. The kind conferred upon them a decoration in recognition of their services for the public good. Under the act of April 3, 1902, provision is made for an arbitration court at Copenhagen, where employers and employees elect by agreement to establish such a court for the adjustment of their differences. The king may by decree determine that witnesses may be summoned and be requested to testify, just as they are in any regular court. Witnesses are required to appear at the time and the place determined upon by the president of the arbitration court. Every inhabitant of Copenhagen and of certain districts about Copenhagen are subject to call as witnesses. Decisions handed down by the president of the court may be appealed in accordance with the rules governing appeals from an ordinary lower court. There is in Copenhagen an employers' association, the pur-

pose of which is to guard the interests of employers as labor unions do those of the employees. This association publishes a weekly paper.

Of arbitration in New South Wales, Consul Baker, at Sydney, reports: The arbitration law of New South Wales has been in operation over a year, and it has been found that so long as its decisions are in accordance with the wishes of the employers there has been no resistance, but whenever a decision has been adverse to them they have shown a spirit of resistance. In April last the Colliery Employees' Federation brought action against the company for which they were working, asking more favorable terms from the court than were given by the company. The case was tried by the court and a decision rendered, under which the men began work; but finding that they made less money than the scale fixed by the court than they had formerly made, they resolved not to work any longer, and 400 miners ceased, refusing to abide by the order of the court. This was, it was claimed by the employers, clearly a rebellion against the law and order. The conduct of the strikers was brought before the court and a decision rendered that the employers had their remedy in a prosecution, for damages, of the men who refused to work. In a general way the employers hold that it is incumbent upon a union whose officials profess to be loyal to the court to expel its members who are not.

BEAUTIFUL TRIBUTE TO CHRISTIAN FAITH

(The Most Reverend Archbishop A. Christie of Portland on Easter.)

"Easter morn brings to the believing world the conviction that the grave is not the end of man. 'He is risen, he is not here,' thus have the evangelists recorded the most stupendous event in the annals of human history.

"Rationalism may exhaust its strength in the futile endeavor to destroy the truth of Christ's resurrection, but Christianity, Christ's place in the hearts of men today, and the indubitable integrity of the sacred historians give to reasonable, truth-loving men a belief that is not in vain.

"To the Christian Christ's resurrection from the dead holds the essential place in the ground work of Christian faith, which, St. Paul the apostle assigned it, when he said: 'And if Christ be not risen again, then is our preaching vain, and your faith is also vain. Then they also that are fallen asleep in Christ are perished.'

"Indeed Christ himself, before he had tasted the bitter chalice of his passion, appealed to his future resurrection as the final proof which would justify his claims to a divine mission—to a divine character. 'Destroy this temple and in three days I will rebuild it.' That Christ fulfilled his promise upon Easter morn, is a historical fact, sustained by evidence incontrovertible and overwhelming. The risen Christ manifested himself time and time again to competent witnesses, that their testimony might silence the

doubting Thomases of all generations and provide his followers with an irrefutable argument for all time.

"The resurrection of Christ is the bulwark of Christian faith—it is also the foundation of Christian hope. 'As is Adam all die, so also in Christ all shall be made alive.'

"His resurrection is the pledge of our resurrection. His triumph, the symbol of our triumph. 'Be thou faithful unto death and I will give to thee the crown of life.' This is the consoling promise that Christ addresses to the Christian heart on Easter morn. This, the sublime hope held out to us; a hope that will be realized if we are loyal to him, who by the event of Easter morn proved his claim to be indeed 'the way, the truth and the life.'

"That Almighty God may bring home to every Christian heart this lesson of consoling hope—that He may enkindle in the hearts of young and old stronger and truer love of our divine redeemer is the Easter prayer of 'Your humble servant in Christ.'
