

## McCOY BEATS THE DUTCH

Placke, the Holland Fugilist Easily Defeated by American

Philadelphia, April 6.—Harry Placke the champion of Holland, made a sorry spectacle of himself last night in a fight with Kid McCoy at the Lenox Club. Standing six inches taller and weighing 70 pounds or more than his pale-faced opponent, he was beaten almost insensibly in less than four minutes.

Placke never laid a glove on McCoy, except when the men clinched, and the cool, calculating McCoy darted in and out and around his burly opponent almost like lightning. He would feint with his right, and then drive his left to the face viciously, scarcely ever failing to bring the blood.

In the first round Placke was covered with blood from his waist to his neck, and his eyes were almost closed. Just before the gong sounded announcing the close of the first round, McCoy drove a vicious flush to the chin, dropping Placke like a log. The gong saved him from being knocked out. He was carried to his corner, only to be knocked out 10 seconds after the second round was called. McCoy feinted with his right, and then drove his left square to the point of Placke's chin. The latter intuitively placed his left hand over the damaged organ and dropped to his knees. The blood was running from him in a stream. As he knelt by the ropes the police appeared at the ring-side and stopped the bout.

Placke came into the ring at 10:03 p. m. It was 10 minutes later when McCoy appeared in the ring. Placke announced his weight at 241½ pounds and McCoy at 163.

## WRIGHT DEFEATS CAMPBELL

Tacoma Democrats Elect Their Mayor and Four Councilmen

Tacoma, April 6.—The city election yesterday resulted in a mixed victory. The Democrats elected George P. Wright, mayor, and four councilmen, and the Republicans controller, treasurer and four councilmen.

The defeat of Mayor Campbell for re-election was due to opposition to a third term, and the mayor's alleged friendship for Governor McBride, it being reported there was a combine between them on the state and senatorial candidates.

## LORD CARRIES PRIMARIES

Olympia, April 6.—C. J. Lord, candidate for the Republican gubernatorial nomination, made a clean sweep of Olympia in yesterday's primaries, and carried all but three or four precincts in the county. Solid delegations for Lord were elected in every ward in Olympia by majorities ranging from 10 to 30. The sixth ward, which since 1896 has been controlled by the "Boxer" element, gave Lord a majority of 10. The total vote cast was 885, Lord delegations getting a total majority of 168.

## G. O. P. GOLDEN JUBILEE

First Republican Club Celebrates Fiftieth Anniversary Tonight

Camden, N. J., April 6.—Great preparations have been made by the republicans of the Fifth ward of this city to celebrate tonight the semi-centennial of the organization of the first republican club in the United States. This club was formed in Camden, although other places claim the honor. Justice of the Peace Braker, familiarly known as the "War Horse" of the republican party, is one of the few surviving persons who formed the club that is now the great republican party. Mr. Braker has the original circular that was issued in the early part of 1854 by the old line whigs and free soilers for a meeting of the Jefferson democratic club in the court house on April 6. The meeting was held and the name selected was the Jefferson Republican club. At the election held that year the new party polled twenty-two votes. Of this number eighteen were polled in the old south ward, now the Fifth ward, of Camden.
