Homer Davenport Coming.

Homer Davenport, the great cartoonist, will visit Salem on Monday, and will speak about "The Power of a Cartoon," at the M. E. church. Davenport, whose magnificent work as a cartoonist is known all over America, is a splendid story teller, and his lecture is made up of a choice collection of stories, anecdotes, and experiences of all kinds. There is not a moment during his discourse that is not full of absorbing interest. He tells his stories, crayon in hand, and illustrates them with rapid cartoon drawings. Nothing more concise has ever been said of him than the remark of ex-Governor Bob Taylor: "Davenport is a volume of wit and humor, and each cartoon tells an eloquent story." Although the trend of his lecture is of a humorous vein, some of his stories have their pathetic side, the story of the "Widowed Duck," for instance. But witty or pathetic, they are told as only Davenport, with his magnetic personality, can tell them, and illustrated with drawings that papers have paid him fabulous sums to obtain. From a ne'er do well in the little Western town of Silverton, he has, in a few years, risen to the pinnacle of success, and is sought for at the present moment by half the newspapers in New York, offering the highest salary every paid to a cartoonist, but before "going into harness again," Mr. Davenport intends touring to the other coast—getting fresh ideas and recuperating after a long spell of hard work. The tickets for his lecture are now on sale.

Insurance Commissioner Reports.

The annual report of the insurance commissioner has been issued and covers the business of fire, marine, accident and life insurance in a thorough manner. The total number of insurance companies authorized to transact business in the state is as follows: Fire, 47; fire and marine, 10; life, 27; life and accident, 12; plate glass, 5; surety, 3; boiler, 1. The total amount of risks written during the past year by the fire insurance companies was \$95,531,484.84, an increase of \$9,000,000 during the year. The gross premiums collected were \$2,245,372.66, with losses at \$1,314,600.29, and premium returned of \$468,834.40, leaving net premiums of \$607,704.47. The increase in losses from \$659,148.77 caused several of the companies to have deficiencies, but not for large amounts. The Hartford Life Insurance failed to render its annual statement and Commissioner Dunbar revoked the license. Eight companies have been admitted to do business in the state during the year and 13 have withdrawn.
