IMPORTANT RAILROAD CHANGES

Train Dispatcher's Office to Be Moved to Roseburg From Ashland

Roseburg, Ore., April 8.—Several important changes are to be made in the operation of the Southern Pacific Railroad lines in Oregon and California in about 10 days from this date. One of the most notable of these changes is an entire re-arrangement of the train dispatchers' divisions. Heretofore the Portland office has had supervision as far south as Roseburg, and the Ashland office was in charge from Roseburg to Dunsmuir. The divisions are now to be shortened considerably and another train dispatcher's office established. The Ashland office, in charge of Dispatcher G. C. Morris, will be removed to Roseburg, from here he will have charge of all lines between Junction and Ashland. A new dispatcher's office will be established at Dunsmuir, with supervision from Ashland to Redding, Cal. This will more evenly distribute the burden of work which is over-crowding the present offices.

In addition to the transfer here of the train dispatcher's office from Ashland, a number of additional train men and engine men will also make Roseburg their headquarters hereafter.

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ter. This will occasion the removal here from Ashland of about 15 families—a gain for Roseburg that will be appreciated by our people.

The coming here of Chief Dispatcher Morris and his crew of three regular trick dispatchers will very likely occasion the transfer of the local operations to other points. Station Agent L. B. Moore will not be affected by the change, except in being relieved of the additional duties he has had as trainmaster at this station. He will thereafter be able to give his whole time to the increasing duties of the station work. The proposed change promises to be of much permanent and increasing benefit to this city. It will make Roseburg by far the most important railway town in Western Oregon, excepting only Portland. It is also very probable that this change will be followed ere long by the erection of a large new round house and repair shops here, and the inauguration of other extensive improvements in the local railroad yards.

Mr. E. E. Calvin, the new general manager of the O. R. & N. and Southern Pacific railroad lines in Oregon, passed through here this afternoon enroute south in a special train, making his first official trip over this division.

FIGHTS FOR NEGRO

Wealthy Clubman Creates Sensation in St. Paul

St. Paul, Minn., April 8.—The board of governors of the Executive Minnesota Club, of which J. J. Hill, Elbert Young, Jule M. Hannaford, and a half dozen other millionaires, are members, will demand an explanation, which may be followed with expulsion, from M. Doran, Jr., himself wealthy and the son of a millionaire broker. Mr. Doran's democratic notions have upset the club and caused a nine days' sensation.

Mr. Doran recently toured the city on a campaign errand with Irving Gotling, his negro valet, for the purpose of capturing the colored vote. He is a member of the city assembly, a prominent democrat and a candidate for re-election. The two spent the day electioneering, and late in the afternoon Gotling saved his master from a violent attack of a drunken negro with a razor, which occurred in a negro saloon. The master and servant then left and walked toward the club.

"Take dinner with me," Mr. Doran invited. Gotling demurred, but was persuaded and Mr. Doran marched his guest into the magnificent Flemish dining room and ordered the colored waiter to serve himself and his guest. "Against orders, sah," the waiter remonstrated. "Do as I say," Mr. Doran commanded.

The waiter refused and Mr. Doran promptly applied force. A fight ensued in which the waiter was very roughly handled and Mr. Doran and his negro guest summarily ejected. They proceeded to a less exclusive restaurant and dined together.

Frantic attempts were made to hush the matter up, which succeeded until today, when Mr. Doran himself admitted the facts and gave his version.

"There was some trouble at the club," he said. "The negro was with me. He had been helping me all day long. He is a good man and I can see no reason for the club's objections."

KING CHRISTIAN CELEBRATES

Denmark's Sovereign Hale and Hearty on Eighty-Sixth Birthday

Copenhagen, April 8.—In the midst of a family gathering of kings and queens, dukes and duchesses, to say nothing of numerous royalties of lesser degree, the venerable King Christian, dean of all the world's rulers and "father-in-law of European royalty," celebrated today his eighty-sixth birthday. Besides Crown Prince Frederick and Prince Valdemar, who are residents of Copenhagen, the family party included King Christian's second son, King George of Greece, his daughters, the Dowager Empress of Russia, the Duchess of Cumberland and Queen Alexandra of England, the latter being accompanied by King Edward and Princess Charles of Denmark.

There have been reports of late that the old king's health is exceedingly precarious, and some of the rumor-mongers have even gone so far as to state that, from a mental point of view, he has fallen into a state of senile decay. These reports are absolutely without foundation, as any person may testify who has had the pleasure of meeting him. Some months ago he was rather seriously ill, but his splendid and marvelous physique enabled him to pull through all right and today, though not far from the ninetieth milestone of life's journey, is in the full enjoyment of excellent health. Those who see him daily in the grounds about Fredensborg or on his way to the riding school cannot but be impressed by his soldierly bearing and still handsome face and figure.

Far from being in a state of mental collapse, as reported, the old king still looks after the affairs of his kingdom with as keen and watchful an eye as ever he did. Rising at his customary early hour he has a solitary breakfast and after a turn in the gardens 9 o'clock invariably finds him perusing the newspapers. State business is the next item on the program, and by eleven o'clock the king wishes to be alone. With his lighted cigar, he takes his stand at the ground floor window of the castle to watch the parade and relief of the soldiers on guard, he scrutinizes his guards with the skilled eye of an old

soldier, and the smallest irregularity cannot escape him.

As before stated, there is not the slightest foundation for the reports that the king is "fast breaking up" and that his death may be looked for at any time. It is true, however, that in deference to the pleadings of his subjects in deference to the pleadings of his
