

LAUNDRY CARS MUST GO

Side Walks Will Be Kept Clear of the Mongolian Hand Carts

The text of the ordinance passed at the session of the council last evening relating to obstructing the side walks, cross walks and street intersections is as follows:

Each and every person, company and corporation are hereby prohibited to drive, to wheel or to draw upon any sidewalk within the city limits any hand truck or hand wagon, excepting baby carriages, paper carts, mail carts, hand store-trucks, wheelbarrows, hand carts not exceeding 24 inches in width and children's wagons not exceeding 24 inches in width. Each and every person, company and corporation having in charge any animal, vehicle, locomotive or street car, are hereby prohibited to leave, stop or stand such animal, vehicle or railway car locomotive or street car upon or over any cross walk, street crossing street intersection, so as to obstruct such walk, street crossing or street intersection.

The second section provides for a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$50 for a violation of this ordinance.

KIDNAPED CHILD RECOVERED

Tacoma Woman Engages in 6,000 Mile Chase After Her Son

Tacoma, Wash., April 8.—After a chase of more than 6000 miles, Mrs. Shumia Geha has returned to Tacoma from Southern California. She was accompanied by her 11-year-old son, who was kidnapped from the home of the mother while a suit for divorce was pending in the local courts. The father after securing possession of the boy disappeared from the city. The child was later heard of in various parts of Washington and in British Columbia. The mother made desperate efforts to find the father and her child, but her efforts proved unavailing until recently. Tiring of the struggle, Mrs. Geha, who is a dark-eyed Assyrian, employed the services of a local detective agency and the chase after the boy began.

The detectives located the child in a family of a settler near Port Townsend, but when they arrived at the place they found that the father and child had disappeared again. The pair were later located at Victoria, B. C., where the father had placed the boy in the care of a private school. While the detectives were engaged in securing evidence against Geha, the latter grew suspicious and left with the boy for the East.

Changing his name, Geha arrived at a small town in Connecticut called Ansonia, where as was his custom, he placed the child in a school. The fact that the child wrote to playmates here was what led to the location of the pair for a third time. The mother this time took up the chase herself, but again was disappointed. The father and the boy left for Southern California where the detectives succeeded in locating him again. The mother this time succeeded by using a clever disguise in discovering her son in a private school in Los Angeles. With the aid of the United States marshal and the courts, Mrs. Geha obtained possession of her child and returned north. Geha, who is a dealer in fancy goods, made his escape and is now presumed to be in Mexico.

COURT HOUSE ITEMS

Things of Interest Gathered Around the County Offices

A large hop contract was filed this morning, Yuen Yok, Yong Gee, Sam Kin and Sue Poon agreeing to deliver to H. J. Miller 60,000 pounds of hops this fall, the latter to advance \$700 at the present time, and 5 cents a pound at picking time. The hops are to be handled on commission.

The following real estate transfers were recorded today:

C. B. Moores to E. Ward, lots 3 and 4, block 24, Highland addition to Salem, \$80.

Bank of Woodburn to J. Gow, part of lots in Woodburn, \$1200.

Department No. 2 of the circuit court adjourned to June 8th.

Coblentz & Levy commenced action against Cochran Bros., of Hubbard, for \$419.50, alleged to be due several wholesale houses in Portland.

Sophronia Jessup has commenced an action in ejectment against George D. Sprague, C. A. Clark, A. C. Smith, R. A. Bradley, R. A. West, Hermann Barr, Winnifred Barr, Patrick Fennell and Kate Winkler for the possession of the property adjoining the Salem hotel on the east. Plaintiff claims in her complaint that defendants are wrongfully withholding the possession from her, and she asks for rent and waste amounting to \$1589, and her costs and disbursements. The trouble grew out of an alleged agreement of the plaintiff with Mrs. Margaret Fennell, now deceased, for the purchase of the premises, and the defendants have been in possession of the same since January 15, 1902. The parties directly interested in the action are the heirs of Mrs. Fennell, who are the three last named defendants. The case has been in court once before on another phase, but the matter will probably be settled before the termination of this action. Carson and McMahon appear for the plaintiff.

The time of the county court was occupied this afternoon with hearing petitions for the establishment of two new school districts from portions of district No. 58, 61, 79 and 11, being the district in the Turner, Ale and Aumsville neighborhoods and extending to the Santiam. The petitioners were represented by Carson & Adams, while the remonstrators appeared by A. O. Condit and Bonham & Martin. The entire upper country seemed to be interested in the outcome of the dispute, as over a score of witnesses were on hand to give testimony. Frank Mack and Attorney Condit had a rapid fire encounter for a short time, and furnished plenty of amusement by their sallies, but the court wanted the facts, and late this afternoon was getting down to the meat in the question. About two dozen petitions, remonstrances, motions and affidavits are on file, and the case presents the aspect of a hearing in the supreme court. Several petitions were filed asking for the two additional districts, to be made out of territory now embraced in the four old districts, and the petitions were granted by County Superintendent Moore.

RETIRED MILL OWNER

Visits Salem Factory and Is Well Pleased

J. W. Hirst and F. A. Fisher, of Louisville, Ky., are at the Willamette while on a trip of the coast. Mr. Hirst is a retired woolen mill owner, and formerly conducted several large factories in the East and South. He paid a visit to the excellent mill in this city, and was much pleased with the quality of goods manufactured, and the completeness of the machinery. This is his first trip to Oregon, and, although he is accustomed to a mild, Southern climate, he said the Web-foot air was just about right and he enjoyed it. Mr. Fisher is traveling in the interest of mill supplies.

The Power of a Cartoon.

Mr. Davenport, whose cartoons are as eagerly looked for as the news items in the New York papers, promises to become as well known as a speaker as he is as a cartoonist. Many are the tales told of his boyhood days in the little Western town of Silverton, Oregon. Instead of attending to business, the "hope of Silverton" spent his time in caricaturing his employers, and consequently was always in search of employment. At last, however, a local paper employed him, and from a "jack of all trades" he has risen meteorically to be the most popular cartoonist in America.

Mr. Davenport has developed an extraordinary ability for story telling, and his lecture, or rather succession of stories, which he illustrates with rapid cartoon drawings, keeps his audience in a continual bubble of merriment. In illustrating the influence that a cartoon has upon the public, he tells the story of the time that public opinion was strong against Admiral Dewey. Davenport's cartoon—now famous—entitled "Let We Forget," published at an opportune moment, completely restored him to favor.

Many other tales, each told as only Homer Davenport can tell them, makes up an entertainment that no one can afford to miss.

Although his victims have been many, they bear him no malice, and are numbered amongst his most intimate friends. When Senator Hanna—probably the greatest sufferer—was asked his opinion of Davenport, he simply remarked: "He's a genius." The advance sale is now open.
