Eastern Oregon Coroner Believes in Making Crime Public

(Pendleton East Oregonian.)

Dr. W. G. Cole, coroner of Umatilla county, in discussing with an East Oregonian reporter the matter of the increase of suicide among young girls and the apparent increase of immorality, uttered some unvarnished truths, as follows:

"It will be the policy of the coroner's office hereafter to give to the public all the revolting details of these unfortunate cases. It has been the policy to conceal from the sordid view of the public many details which would humiliate and wound the feeling of parents and friends, but the increase of immorality among young men and women is so appalling that something desperate must be done to check the tendency and rob these crimes of their would-be romantic aspects.

"If parents will not or cannot control their young girls and young sons who are old enough to know right

from wrong and if the officials persist in hiding the worst features of these escapades from public view, in order to shield them, it will only have a tendency to increase crime and immorality, and I believe that it is best to discourage all such things by giving the details of every case brought to light, so others who are on the downward path, or are connected with those in trouble in any way, will be deterred from pursuing the wrong path.

"Public sentiment must be turned against these fatal and disgusting affairs. As long as the worst features of these crimes are concealed from public view through respect and pity, many young villains will take hope and pursue their wrong course, and perpetrate their crimes in the belief that it will not be found out on them.

"Exposure of every person connected in any way with crime, and exposure of all the revolting details of these crimes, will educate public sentiment to hate and despise that which is now looked upon as sad, semi-romantic affairs that can be half condemned and excused.

"Hereafter, what comes to my notice in examining into such cases as have attracted attention in this city within this year will be given to the public, and those who are connected with such cases must bear the disgrace, and dishonor they bring upon themselves."

FLOOD VICTIM FOUND.

Another Reminder of Heppner Catastrophe Is Discovered.

Heppner, Or., April 11.—The dead body of a man, doubtless a victim of the June flood, was found last Thursday by Mr. Yocum and two other men while engaged in clearing away a drift in Willow creek below the Evans place, some two miles below Heppner. As the drift was a newly formed one it is evident that the body had been washed there by the recent freshet in the creek. The body was too badly decomposed for identification, but from the gray beard on one side of the face it was judged to be the remains

of an elderly man. While the hands and feet were gone the flesh of the body was fairly well preserved, bearing evidence that the remains had been buried in sand during the nine and a half months since the flood and were washed out by the freshet last week. Some are of the belief the remains are that of a stage driver who suddenly disappeared from Heppner some three months ago and has not since been heard of, but the general appearance of the body found do not warrant such conclusion.

State Makes Money.

There are 323 occupants in the state penitentiary, a number having been received during the last week. Four of these were United States prisoners, for whose board the state receives \$4 per week per man, and as three of them are under six year sentences, and one will do time four years, the state will receive \$4,488 as compensation for looking after Uncle Sam's criminals. The cost to the state for boarding these convicts will not exceed \$725 for the entire time, and it will net a neat profit from the government.
