Upon motion of Ed. Sullivan, the Lincoln county fisherman, Walter L. Tooze, of Marion, was chosen chairman, and Gale S. Hill, of Linn, was chosen secretary.

The committee of permanent organization reported the following order of business:

- 1st—The temporary organization be made permanent.
- 2d—That there be elected two delegates to represent this congressional district in the national convention.
- 3d—That there be elected two alternate delegates to represent this district in the national convention.
- 4th—That there be nominated a candidate for congress.
- 5th—That the counties report their selection of members of the congressional committee.

Report of Committee on Resolutions.

The Republicans of the first Oregon congressional district in convention assembled hereby unanimously endorse the administration of our national government at the hands of President Roosevelt, and most heartily

ly recommend his nomination for President.

We demand a continuance of those financial and industrial policies which, through the instrumentality of the Republican party, have been productive of the greatest prosperity at home and the greatest commercial expansion abroad.

We extend our most cordial greetings to the Oregon delegation in the national congress and senate, and compliment them upon the successful labors they have performed for the promotion of every essential interest of this commonwealth.

The people of Oregon, without party distinction demand the earliest possible completion of the inter-oceanic canal, undertaken with such great determination and brilliant prospects of success, by a Republican administration.

Afternoon Session.

The committee on credentials was a trifle late in reporting, when the reports of the committee on order of business and resolutions were adopted, and, while waiting for the credentials committee to report, a few speeches were asked for. Chairman Brownell modestly declined to speak at that time, but called upon some speeches from the audience. Ex-Gov. Geer responded with a cheerful talk. This was followed by a demand for a speech from ex-Governor Lord, and that gentleman also responded with a few commendatory words. Next Mr. Eddy, of Tillamook, was called for. He spoke with feeling complimentary to the delegates who had come here to be defeated, yet who were willing to take defeat so cheerfully. His reference to Mr. Harris was received with a cheer and all evidence of good feeling.

Mr. Harris was next called for, and upon arising to speak, he was greeted with an outburst of applause. He spoke eloquently for the Republican party, and referred to the nomination of Binger Hermann with cordial good will. He closed by promising the largest vote ever known in Lane county for that gentleman.

Mr. Hamlin and A. F. Hofer, Jr., were appointed assistant secretaries of the convention.

Before the reading of the report on credentials the Salem Military Band favored the convention with a medley of popular American airs. They were given great cheers, and responded with an encore. At this juncture Hon. E. T. Judd suggested that the band play "America," and the convention join in singing with the players. This was heartily done, "according to program," and great enthusiasm followed. Three cheers were then given for the Stars and Stripes.

This was followed by the prosaic reading of the report on credentials. Under the next order of business, the election of delegates to the national convention, Jackson county presented the name of Dr. J. M. Keene.

Clackamas county presented the name of J. U. Campbell, chairman Brownell presenting his name.

There being no further nominations, these two gentlemen were elected by acclamation.

Hofer, in behalf of Marion county, who spoke in behalf of continuity in office for congressman and senator. The motion carried amid great enthusiasm, and the vote was cast as directed. This ended the real business of the convention, and before adjournment Chairman Brownell took occasion to compliment the entire convention, and especially Mr. Harris, upon his cheerful acquiescence in the choice of the convention.

Walter L. Tooze the new chairman of the district central committee, was next called for, and that gentleman responded most eloquently in behalf of the nominee of the convention, and also spoke kind words for the defeated candidate, Mr. Harris. He appealed to all delegates to go home and assist in the re-election of Mr. Hermann in June, and promised to do his full duty to that end.

The convention then adjourned.

Percy R. Kelly, Linn county's active leader, was in the fight with his usual vim, and demonstrated his ability as a good leader.

B. F. Jones, of Toledo, was severely censured by his friends for neglecting to bring out a supply of claims. Ben was there with the goods, nevertheless.

For a county with "nineteen Harris men out of twenty-three" old Marion did pretty well to name a pronounced Hermann for central committeeman.

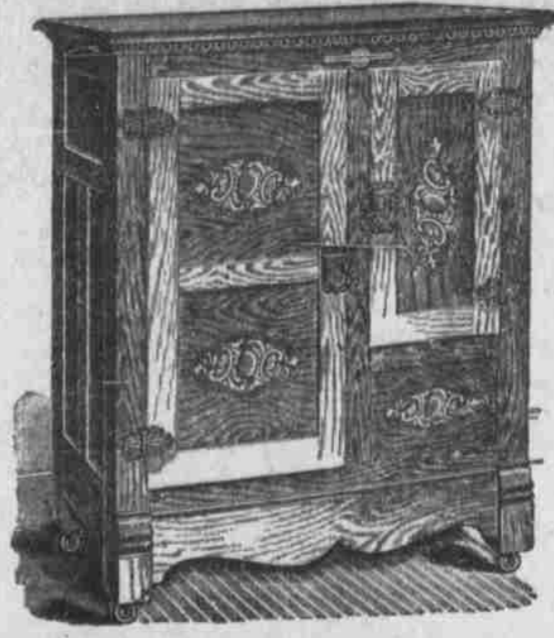
