

CRUSHED BY HIS DEATH

Loss of Admiral Makaroff One That Can Hardly Be Estimated

London, April 13.—The loss of Admiral Makaroff is a blow to Russia that can hardly be estimated. He was the very heart and soul of the Russian aggression at Port Arthur. Up to the time of his assuming the direction of naval affairs, the Russian war ships were crouching and shivering under the guns at Port Arthur, awaiting a renewal of the Japanese intermittent attacks, and when they came the Czar's fighting machines sputtered back in a blind way. In place of all this, Admiral Makaroff actually resumed the offensive. On the night of March 10th he sent six torpedo boats to sea to look for Japanese war ships. They met the enemy, and maintained a hot fight, each side losing a torpedo boat. Observing that his torpedo boat was foundering Makaroff went out with two cruisers to face the entire Japanese fleet, but was too late to be of assistance. This action on the part of the brave Russian was a perfect index to the character of his work, and the manner in which he endeavored to infuse life into the men at Port Arthur.

INDIANS HAVE BIG GAMBLE.

Bucks of Six Tribes Have Long Session Near Tacoma.

Tacoma, Wash., April 13.—After a week's exciting sport the first big gamble that the Indian tribes in this locality have had for years came to a close yesterday. The tribes participating were the Nisquallys, Puyallups, the Mud Bays, the Squaxon Islanders, the Skokomish and the Indians from Hood's Canal.

In winning the game the Nisquallys have come into much property of the other tribes and Alex Soughlet, a Nisqually buck, who came in from the camp, says that many of the losers had scarcely enough blankets left to keep warm. They wagered ponies, dogs, blankets, wearing apparel, eon-skins, firearms and gowgaws of all sorts. The gamble was in a large shack on the Nisqually river, about four miles above the Northern Pacific bridge on the Olympia branch.

The disc was used in gambling. The manipulator fumbles the disc through two small piles of cedar bark ground fine. The Indians opposite guess which side of the hole holds the black. If correct, it counts a point for his side. They played for 500 points.

Kashatalinski reports that on the night of the 11th, a suspicious looking boat approached the mouth of the river Laohoe. The Russians immediately opened fire, when the lights on the boat were put out, and the craft retired. At the beginning of the cannonade seven junks put out from the right bank of the river, but as soon as the firing commenced, were headed out to sea.

Again the Japs.

Tokio, April 13.—A dispatch from Wiju states that a company of Russian troops attempted to cross the Yalu west of town this morning. A company of Japs drove them back. Twenty Russians are known to have been killed, and they belonged to the Twelfth regiment of sharpshooters.

Several other Russian parties have been repulsed in an attempt to cross the river.

DISASTER HAS BEEN CONFIRMED

Russian General Staff State That Report Catastrophe Is True

St. Petersburg, April 13.—The general staff has confirmed most of the details of the blowing up of the Russian battleship Petropavlovsk by a mine this morning at Port Arthur.

Twenty-five sailors escaped from the ill-fated vessel in addition to the four officers mentioned. The escape of Grand Duke Cyril was marvelous. Although seriously injured he swam ashore.

The Czar has dispatched a courier to Madame Makaroff, conveying his condolences.

Report of Admiral Grigorowich.

St. Petersburg, April 13.—Vice-Admiral Grigorowich sends the following official account of the loss of the Petropavlovsk: "The Petropavlovsk struck a mine at the entrance of the harbor today. The mine exploded and the vessel was overturned. Our squadron was near Golden Mountain at the time. The Japanese were then approaching Port Arthur. Vice-Admiral Makaroff is apparently dead. Grand Duke Cyril, Captain Yekovloeff, with five officers and 32 sailors, escaped. A number of bodies have already been recovered."

WILL WALK UNDER WATER.

Unique Trip to Be Undertaken by Wisconsin Man.

La Crosse, Wis., April 13.—The latest unique trip is one contemplated by Henry Hoffman, of La Crosse, Wis. Hoffman who is a deep sea diver, intends to walk from La Crosse to St. Louis, a distance of 600 miles, on the bed of the Mississippi river.

He will start as soon as the water warms up a little, and he expects to make the trip in four months' time. He will be accompanied by a boat carrying air pumps and provisions, and claims he will leave the water only for meals and to sleep. Hoffman has ordered a special diving suit in which to make the novel trip.

Automobile Works destroyed.

Detroit, Mich., April 13.—A fire started in the varnish room of the Cadillac Automobile Works, and, fed by gasoline, destroyed one of the largest plants of its kind in the country this morning.

Two workmen were injured while escaping from the burning building.

The firm had \$3,000,000 worth of orders on hand.

Mormons Have Disappeared.

Washington, D. C., April 13.—Six of the 12 mormon witnesses for whom summons have been issued by the senate committee to appear and testify in the Smoot case, have disappeared. All efforts to find them have been in vain.

Chairman Burrows sent word to President Smith that it is very unfortunate for the church that these people have gone into hiding. Bishop Grant, who is one of the witnesses, is known to be in Europe.

Would Defer Investigation.

Washington, D. C., April 13.—It was learned this afternoon that President Roosevelt is not in sympathy with the plan of the senate leaders to have the postoffice investigation held this summer, and that he is endeavoring to dissuade them from that course, believing it would be futile as well as impolitic. The President said as much to Senator Aldrich, who was summoned from the conference.

WEBB'S PROPERTY ATTACHED.

New York Swell Accused of False Representations.

New York, April 13.—Justice Blanchard in the supreme court today issued an attachment in an action brought by Arthur L. Meyer against the property of Dr. Seward Webb, in this state. The attachment was served. The suit is brought to recover \$400,000 with interest from December 15, 1901.

In the affidavit on which the attachment was granted, Meyer says that on August 1, 1901, Dr. Webb was the owner of income bonds which had been issued by the Mohawk & Malone Railroad Company, of the par value of \$3,900,000, and induced him (Meyer) to purchase them by falsely representing that the New York Central & Hudson River Railroad Company was desirous of purchasing the bonds and through its officials offered to purchase them for a price exceeding \$3,900,000.

"These representations," says the affidavit, "were made to me with the knowledge of their falsity on the part of the defendant, and with intent to cheat and defraud me for the purpose of inducing me, in reliance thereon, to pay him the sum of \$3,900,000, which was largely in excess of the actual value of the bonds to the extent of \$400,000."

Episcopalians at Los Angeles.

Los Angeles, Cal., April 13.—Prominent clergymen and laymen of the Episcopal church to a total of nearly 1,000 are gathered in Los Angeles for the annual missionary conference of the seventh district. The states and territories represented at Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Colorado, Montana, Nevada, California, Utah, Alaska, Arizona, New Mexico and the Philippine Islands.

The conference opened at 10 o'clock this morning with the celebration of the holy communion in St. Paul's pro-cathedral, the sermon being preached by the Rt. Rev. W. F. Nichols, bishop of California. The sessions will continue through the remainder of the week. In addition to discussing various matters of business relative to the numerous churchmen of wide prominence.
