ALLEGED GRAFTER BOUNCED

Justice Cann of Seattle Forced to Abandon His Office

Seattle, Wash., April 13.—Justice of the Peace T. H. Cann has been forced to resign as the result of a fight made upon him by the police department and the daily newspapers of Seattle. His resignation, effective April 30th, has been filed with the county commissioners.

During the past two days Cann has been accused openly of having accepted money from first ward fixers to influence his decision in cases where men under the protection of these court hangers-on were interested. He was accused of having solicited small presents from the saloon keepers and others who might come before his court. Without more than a general denial of his guilt, the justice of the peace abandoned his office.

Cann has been a resident of this city for more than a quarter of a century. Prior to that time he lived in Oregon, and at one time was connected with the Roseburg land office. He was involved in a scandal there, and came north. His trip West was made in prairie schooner, and at the present he is a bent, decrepit figure, a worn-out old man.

NOTED MINE SOLD

May Flower Group Changes Hands After a Year of Negotiation

Howard, Or., April 13.—The Lewis McCallister quartz claims known as the Mayflower group, were last week taken over by Thron Thronson, J. A. Thronson and C. J. Thronson, with deeds from them transferring the property to the Oregon Mayflower Company, a Washington corporation. This closes a deal begun a year ago, when the buyers took an option on the ground. The price paid is understood to be \$25,000.

The history of the camp is one of varied experiences. In the early '70s placer deposits were extensively worked on Scissors creek and Gold hill, and large amounts of gold were taken out, due credit for which has never been given to Crook county. Quartz veins were later discovered, and upon these considerable development work has been done.

Valuable Ore Removed. The Mayflower vein, from which the group takes its name, has been opened to a depth of 125 feet. Several hundred tons of ore have been extracted from these workings, some of which has been shipped to smelters, the values running up to \$125 a ton, chiefly in gold. Other veins have also been developed. The present owners have driven a tunnel 340 feet to tap the Cranston vein, and, while nothing has been given out, it is known that ore has been struck.

It is learned from Thron Thronson, who is in charge of the development work, that it is the intention of the company to install machinery on the Mayflower vein to systematically develop its depth. During the summer a 10-ton mill for treating the ores by the cyanide process will be erected. A large amount of ore is in the bins ready for treatment, and the owners expect to keep the mill in constant operation.

Great Improvements. The old tunnel will be repaired and an upraise run to the surface. The hoist and mill will be erected on Gold hill at the strong outcrop of the vein, the site being ideal for handling the ores.

The water from the shaft will be discharged through the tunnel. Water and timber are abundant, and in general the situation is a very favorable one as regards access and climate.

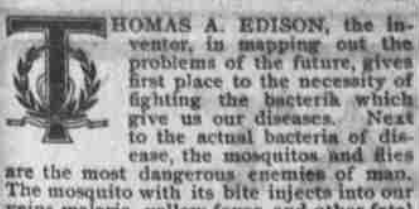
The district is on the headwaters of the Ochoco river, 28 miles above Prineville. Howard postoffice is located on the ground. To the south, a distance of five or six miles, lie the Lookout Mountain camps, where cinabar has been discovered and general activity is expected with the advent of favorable weather. A telephone line is now under construction to connect the camp with Prineville and the outside world.

A Classification. The veins of the district are classed as true fissures and the country rock is porphyry passing on one hand into andesites and dolerites and on the other hand into diorites. The ores are replacement of the crushed porphyry and consist of mispicket, pyrite, galena, blende stibnite, rhodochrosite, bismuth in a gangue or quartz calcite and earthy aluminous-magnesian matter. The ores are high grade, generally in gold, but high silver values are constantly met with.
