#### PRESBYTERY MEETS.

Willamette Members in Session at Albany Today.

Albany, Or., April 13.—The Willamette Presbytery of the Presbyterian church met in this city last evening, and organized for business. Last night the opening meeting was held at the church, where Rev. Robert Ennis, of Turner, the retiring moderator, preached the sermon, in accordance with custom. The Presbytery then organized by electing Rev. J. E. Snyder, of Brownsville, moderator for the ensuing term, with Rev. W. T. Wardelle, of Dallas, as clerk, and Rev. H. A. Garrick, of Corvallis, as reporter. Rev. E. J. Thompson, of Corvallis, is the stated clerk of the Presbytery. After the perfection of the organization the Presbytery adjourned and repaired to Tremont hall, where a reception was tendered the visitors, including the Presbytery, the Presbyterian society and the members of the Presbyterian church of this city, by President and Mrs. Lee. A very pleasant hour was spent, and before the close of the evening refreshments were served.

Today, beginning at 9 a. m. an all-day meeting of the Woman's Missionary Society will be held at the First Presbyterian church, to which all the church and the city generally are invited. It will be one of the most interesting and instructive meetings ever held in this city, and all the ladies interested in missionary work should be in attendance.

The Presbytery will be in session at the college all of today, and the business meetings of the organization will begin this morning. Many delegates from the several churches of the presbytery are already in attendance, and many more are expected to arrive this morning to take part in the meetings.

#### Funeral of Hirose.

Tokio, April 13.—The last sad rites over the remains of Commander Hirose, who was killed March 27th, in the second attempt to bottle up Port Arthur, was held here today. Thousands of people uncovered as the cortege passed. The coffin was borne on a gun carriage, with a full military and naval guard.

The medals of the dead man were carried on a silken pillow.

## NO JAPS FOR THEM

Berlin, April 13.—Fifty-five hundred poles, fleeing from Russia in the endeavor to evade conscription, have arrived at Posen.

## JEW'S WANDER

Berlin, April 13.—Fifty Jewish families, numbering 400 persons, who fled from Lompalanka, Bulgaria, as a result of the anti-semitic outbreak, sought refuge at Widin. Being driven from that place they wandered to Kalafat, Roumania. Here again they were ordered away, and the refugees are now bivouacking on the Roumania bank of the Danube, in a pitiable condition, bordering on famine.

#### DIED.

SIMMONS.—At his home, on South Commercial street, Wednesday, April 13, 1904, Mr. L. O. Simmons, aged 56 years.

Deceased was born September 22, 1848, in Charlwood, Surry county, England, and came to Oregon in 1868, and settled in Linn county, where he remained a year, and then came to Salem, where he lived until 1872, when he returned to England, and was married to Miss Tamar Fieldwick, on November 9, 1872. They came back to Oregon in October, 1873, and settled at Salem, where they made them a home, and have lived ever since.

Mr. Simmons was well-known in Salem, where he has a host of warm friends who mourn his death. He was a kind and generous man, and was always seeking to help wherever he could. He was a devoted member of the Pentecostal Mission. Deceased leaves, besides the widow, three brothers, William Simmons, of Shedd, Ore; Alfred Simmons and Archie Simmons, residence unknown, and Edwin Simmons, of Eugene, his sister, Mrs. M. A. Dancy, having died two years ago.

The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock (unless otherwise changed) at the Leslie M. E. Church. Rev. M. L. Ryan will conduct the funeral services, and interment will be had in City View cemetery.
