Timber Land Entries.

Last Saturday Senator Fulton and Congressman Williamson took the matter before Secretary Hitchcock and Land Commissioner Richards and following is a report of the proceedings: Senator Fulton stated that while there were unquestionable cases of fraud under the land laws, the great majority of the entrymen are honest and conscientious people, and it is unjust that they should be put to the annoyance and compelled to suffer hardships of a long-drawn-out investigation where there is nothing in the proof submitted to indicate that they have been guilty of fraud. He stated that where there is anything to indicate fraud in a particular case, no one will object to such case being investigated and, indeed, the people of Oregon thoroughly approve the action of the department in investigating such cases. But he insisted that those who are acting in good faith ought not to be compelled to suffer because some individuals are found guilty of fraud. He called the attention of the secretary and the commissioner to the fact that when the President annulled the order of general suspension, he stated that he

Judge Hamilton, of Roseburg; E. A. Reames, of Jackson, (who ran last year), and Jack Jeffrey, of Salem, are mentioned as Democratic candidates for congress.

Jacob Voorhees, of Woodburn, was at Albany yesterday, and says he didn't know whether he was in heaven or the other place for a time. The Willamette Presbytery and a Democratic convention were in session at the same time.

On the train Monday a number of prominent Republican politicians were discussing Hermann's nomination for congress. One of them said he had never yet voted for Hermann, and did know as he would this time. Along came Conductor Veatch, of the Albany milk-shake local, and said: "I am a Democrat, but I have always voted for Binger, and expect to vote for him every time he runs." There was a laugh at the expense of the other fellow.

After awhile these boys will be old Republicans, and a lot of younger fry will divide the honors with them.

Gale S. Hill, the secretary of this congressional district, is a son of "old Doc Hill," of Albany, a lecturer at the Willamette medical college, and nephew of W. Lair Hill, annotator of the code, and whilom editor of the Portland Oregonian. He is a young lawyer at Albany, with a natural born talent for politics and not so big a law practice but that he can give some time and attention to the matter.

Well, everybody got something in the second ward, although the boys do say Eber LaFore and Jim Kyle put themselves out of business on their own motions.

George S. Wright, of Yamhill county is the Republican nominee for joint senator with Tillamook and Lincoln. He is a Marion county boy, and will make a good member of the state senate. George has hosts of friends, and will be easily elected.

It is believed that Col. Jeff Myers would be available as Democratic candidate for congress in this district if either side needed him in the race.

There are no sore places among the Marion county Republicans, and Salem factions are a minus quantity. There are no old or young Republicans, but just Republicans, and as soon as they get their second wind from convention shouting, they will present a solid front in a good, old-fashioned ratification of the whole ticket. The Republicans of the Capital City have great interests at stake in keeping this the banner Republican city, county and state in the Union.
