HAS SOME DEFECTS

Plumbing Law Similar to Barbers' Law

Test Case Made With View to Having It Declared Invalid

Portland, April 18.—The constitutionality of the statute licensing and regulating the plumbing trade and licensing plumbers is to be tested. The law is alleged to be similar to the barbers act, which Judge George recently decided was not constitutional, because it authorizes the state board of barber examiners to adopt rules and regulations providing what qualification barbers must possess to entitle them to work at the trade. The court held that it is for the legislature to say what qualifications are necessary, and that the legislature cannot delegate its powers to a board of plumbers.

In the act to license plumbers, it is said, the legislature has again delegated its power to a board, and the law is said to be subject to their legal objections.

In order to bring the matter before the courts, Paxton, Beach & Simon, attorneys, caused A. Claussenius, Jr., to be arrested and convicted in the municipal court yesterday on a charge of violating the plumbing statute. Yesterday afternoon the attorneys filed a petition for a writ of habeas corpus in behalf of Claussenius in the state circuit court, and when the petition comes up for argument the constitutional question will be raised in support of the issuance of the writ. The case will no doubt be carried to the supreme court for a final decision. Claussenius is at liberty on bonds.

KLONDIKE RAILWAY ASSURED.

Money Raised for Road Running Out of Dawson.

Seattle, Wash., April 18.—The Klondike mines railway out of Dawson is assured, according to a cablegram received last night by L. B. Gates, the Second-avenue jeweler. The message came from C. E. Hawkins and W. H. Parsons, who are now in London, where they went to raise money to complete the road. The dispatch reads as follows: "Railway deal closed. More than satisfactory. Money up."

Mr. Hawkins, as engineer, built the White Pass & Yukon railway. The Klondike Mines road has about a mile of track completed, and some rolling stock is on the ground. Construction was delayed temporarily by a lack of funds.

Hawkins and parsons will leave England as soon as possible for New York and will go direct to Dawson. Work will be resumed as soon as possible.

This new railway will extend 50 miles south of Dawson, and reach many streams heretofore little worked because of the cost of transporting supplies from Dawson into the interior. The completion of the road will enable miners to open thousands of paying claims that are today lying idle.

Oriental Quail from China.

Tacoma, April 18.—A consignment of 60 Oriental quail have been received from China by Frank S. Allington, for the Allington fruit farm. They are beautiful birds, being about half the size of the California quail, or nearly as large as the Eastern "Bob White." They stood the voyage well, having been shipped in especially made cages. Heretofore the Oriental quails brought across have arrived

with the feathers worn off the necks through their habit of thrusting their heads through the bars of the cage. This time the cages were made of wire, each wire at the openings being fitted with roller pads, and the trouble was avoided.

In a few days they will be turned loose to find new homes along the coast. Most of them will be turned loose at Westport, about 100 miles from Tacoma, and Damon's point and Gray's Harbor will also be stocked. The Oriental quail is an excellent game bird, but being rapid of flight and always on the alert, will not fall an easy prey to the marksman, so it is hoped that the birds will propagate rapidly.

Sealers Lose Vessel.

Astoria, Or., April 18.—Three members of the crew of the sealing schooner Charlotta G. Cox, of Victoria, B. C., arrived here last evening from Tillamook on the steamer Geo. R. Vosburg. Two are white men and the other a Japanese. They are H. L. Wietzel, hunter; Stanley Bridges, boatpuller, and Mio Sackley, boatsteerer. They say they left the schooner last Saturday morning in their small boat while in sight of land near Cape Mears.

The weather was clear at the time, and by noon they had secured two seals, when the weather grew thick and they lost sight of the schooner. They continued searching for her in that vicinity for 48 hours, and by that time their water and provisions had become exhausted. They went ashore at Cape Mears, and after remaining there over night and securing food they started out again in search of the schooner, but when two more days failed to find her, and the sea was getting very rough, they returned to Cape Mears.

In landing, their small boat was wrecked, and they had a narrow escape, so they were forced to give up their search and started for Victoria, their home port. They will be assisted by the British consul.
