GREAT PROBATE CASE

Reversed by the Supreme Court Involving Important Points in Equity

The supreme court today handed down its opinion, written by Wolverton, J., in the case of David Froeblich, et al., vs. D. F. Lane, personally and as administrator of the estate of Emanuel Friedrich, deceased.

This was a suit commenced in the equity department of the circuit court of Marion county, to set aside and impeach a decree of the county court of said county, approving and adjusting the final account of D. F. Lane, as administrator, on the ground of fraud. The heirs are residents of Germany, and being represented by the German Imperial consul, of Portland, as their attorney in fact.

The fraud consists in the disregarding by the defendant of a compromise agreement entered into with the representatives of plaintiffs, in which it was agreed that he should make no charge for administrator's fees in excess of \$300, in his final account

charging \$1425 attorney's fees and other administrative fees exceeding his commission allowed by law by ever \$225. Plaintiffs also relied upon the concealment of the publication of final notice, and upon certain representations made by them which they relied upon and were induced to remain away from the settlement, having no notice thereof.

The court holds that the plaintiffs were entitled to maintain an original suit in equity for relief, and reverses Judge Boise in sustaining defendant's demurrer.

The respondents were represented on this appeal by W. H. Holmes and Frank Holmes, and the appellants by C. M. Inman and F. A. Turner, of this city, and Gantenbein & Veazle, of Portland.

The estate has been in litigation for nearly four years, both in this county and Multnomah. This last decision will necessitate a trial of the case on its merits in the circuit court and holds the bondsmen of the administrator for any loss to estate, if the new trial should not result in a judgment for the plaintiffs.

New York, April 18.—Governor Hunt, of Porto Rico, arrived here this morning from San Juan. He reported that conditions there were generally encouraging, with American capital rapidly finding its way into the country.

Mrs. Adams was a woman of the finest social qualities, and leaves many friends to mourn for her.
