EXPENSES VERY SMALL

Marion County Officers Use Great Care--Other Court House News

The total expenditures for the month of April by Marion county amounted to \$43,521.84, divided as follows: Roads and highways, \$1278.14; circuit court, \$285; poor, \$470.58; justice courts, \$46.70; sheriff, \$449.33; clerk, \$254.16; recorder, \$233.33; treasurer, \$83.33; school superintendent, \$100; assessor, \$350; current expenses, \$225.04; court house and jail, \$69.56; insane, \$40; election expenses, \$5; county court and commissioners, \$159.40; stock superintendent, \$75; tax rebate, \$4.47.

The fees received by the county clerk during that time amounted to \$347.90, and by the recorder \$435.90.

Salem City Superintendent Honored

County Supt. Lyman, of Clatsop county, who is one of the foremost educators of this state, has issued a program for a county institute at Astoria, covering three days. Some of the best school workers in the Northwest are to be present, and the Astorian says:
