**MADE WRONG MONEY**

**John Anderson Arrested in Portland for Manufacturing the "Queer"**

Portland, April 21.—John Anderson, a clever counterfeiter, was captured here yesterday. Anderson is a genius in mechanics, who has been manufacturing spurious coin so perfect that it is almost impossible of detection from the genuine. He was caught with the bogus coin in his possession and in the brush outside of the city his den and manufacturing paraphernalia were found and confiscated by the federal authorities. Anderson admits his guilt and explained to the officers his method of manufacturing the clever imitations which he has been plying off on the public at the rate of \$3 or \$4 per day.

He was arraigned before Commissioner McKee and pleaded guilty. He was sent to the county jail for safe keeping, and will appear in the court at a later time.

**TROTTER UNDER BONDS**

**The Preliminary Examination Shows That He Had Assaulted His Wife**

(Special to The Journal.)

Stayton, April 21.—The preliminary examination of G. D. Trotter, for assault with intent to kill, was commenced before Justice Queener at 1 o'clock this afternoon. Deputy Prosecuting Attorney J. H. McNary appeared for the state and J. A. Carson for the defendant.

A large number of Stayton people heard the evidence, and the general opinion of the community is that Trotter should be punished for his doings. About a month ago he began to abuse his wife, and at several times subjected her to all manner of indignities, without the least provocation. He procured a rope and tied her on more occasions than one, and often threatened to kill her. Five witnesses were examined for the state, but dozens could have testified against the defendant, if their evidence had been thought necessary.

The witnesses examined were Mrs. G. D. Trotter, the persecuted woman, Mrs. Ferris, Mr. and Mrs. Fred Rock and Pete Ferris.

It was shown by the testimony that Trotter had brutally roped his wife on two different occasions, and beat her up badly. Last Sunday Trotter threatened to repeat his cruelties, and struck his wife in the face with vicious blows of his fists.

Mrs. Trotter's testimony was fully corroborated by the other witnesses, and Trotter made no defense. He was not put on the stand to testify in his own behalf.

At the close of the hearing Justice Queener held Trotter over to the July term of court in \$500 cash bonds.

**TRADED ROAD ROLLERS**

**Marion County Court Gets the Finest Machine in Oregon**

County Judge Scott has made a trade with the Buffalo Pitts Company, of Portland, exchanging the old combination roller for a new Standard steam roller. The new machine arrived from Portland today, and is being unloaded on the Front-street spur near Ferry street. G. W. Evans, the Portland agent of the company, is here to start the machine, and it will begin operations tomorrow. It weighs 24,400 pounds, and is complete in every particular, being a great improvement over the old-style roller. Mr. Evans, in speaking of the change, said: "We gave Marion county the best end of the deal, but Judge Scott has been a leader in the good roads cause, and we appreciate the work that he is doing. We only sell road rollers as a side line, as our principal business is farm machinery, but good roads helps all kinds of trade. It will only be a matter of very short time when the people of the West will realize that they must build roads that will last. We placed this roller in Marion county for the reason that this is considered the head quarters of the good roads movement, and the state convention will be held here this fall. A practical demonstration will do more good to convince the people that good roads can be constructed at a moderate cost, than all the oral arguments that could be advanced in an age. This is the only roller of this kind in the valley, and we desire to have the people see what it can do."

**COURT MEMORIAL**

**LET MEN GO FREE**

**Not Enough Evidence to Convict Box Car Occupants of Felony**

The case of the State vs. Falkenstein, Lombard and Woodward, for entering a Southern Pacific box car and eating oranges, occupied the attention of Judge Judah this morning, and, after hearing the testimony, the court released the prisoners. T. P. Hoffman, J. E. Pelton, R. C. Blair and Chief Gibson were examined for the state, and the defendants were placed on the stand in their own behalf. Deputy District Attorney C. L. McNary appeared for the state and L. H. McMahon for the defendants. The testimony did not connect the defendants with breaking the seal on the car, although they were found inside, and admitted eating the oranges. The defendants claimed that they entered the car through the window, and did not know that the seal had been disturbed. The court did not consider the evidence sufficient to bind the prisoners over to the circuit court, as it would be impossible to convict the men before a jury. The county would be compelled to care for the men from now until July, and they would lose an opportunity to work during the busy season of the year.

Judge Judah, in releasing the prisoners, said: "I am satisfied that these boys went into the car, and perhaps did eat a few oranges. If they were before me for a misdemeanor I would deal with them, but to start three men on the road to the penitentiary is a very serious matter, and, although I want to do my duty to the state and county, I must discharge the defendants. I am constrained to say that the invasion of cars is an every-day occurrence, and the transportation companies should have proper guards to protect their cars and the property of other people in transit." The defendants thanked the court and left the room.
