

TEDDY BOOMERS AT TURNER

Roosevelt League Organized Friday Night

Fine Board of Officers and Great Enthusiasm Pre-vailed--Opening Gun of the Campaign

The Salem team of Roosevelt boomers who went to Turner Friday night met with an equally cordial and enthusiastic reception at the hands of the local Republican organization, and, in the language of the campaign manager, that precinct will give good account of herself in the June election, with a vote for the state and congressional ticket that will give Turner a larger delegation than ever before in the next county convention. A club of about 70 members is in sight and enrolled, and this number will be swelled to 100 or more. The club elected Ed. S. Martin, president, and J. T. Robertson, secretary, with the following vice-presidents: N. W. Silver, B. B. Herrick, Allen Wilson, C. P. Cornelius, Ralph Grimes, H. L. Earl, Wm. Hilleary, Wm. McKay, Daniel Stanton and Wm. Dozier. H. L. Earl was elected treasurer and E. M. Lindsay, W. T. Richards, L. D. Barr, A. McFarland and G. B. Cornelius executive committee.

Short speeches were made by E. Hofer, W. J. Culver, T. B. Kay, H. D. Patton and Chas. A. Murphy. The principal speech of the evening was made by Walter Toozee, of Woodburn, and it was an eloquent effort in behalf of the cause of Republicanism. As congressional chairman he opened the campaign for Binger Hermann's re-election in great shape, and a number of times brought the house down in his old-fashioned style. Four Democrats are on the Roosevelt club roll, and the indications are that he will have a walkover in Oregon in November. The Turner band of 10 pieces made splendid music, and some of the bright ladies of Turner honored the club meeting with their presence, and encouraged the workers and speakers.
