SAINTS WERE SLOW

Received a Severe Drubbing at the Hands of the Rag- lans in Two Games

The 'Saints' started in to do things to the Raglans yesterday afternoon, but could not keep up with the procession, and during the third spasm went high up the murky clouds to remain there during the rest of the agony. Nearly 1000 people were in the enclosure when Umpire McCormack stepped into the diamond and gave the word. Two hits and an error enabled Lee to make the circuit, and when the Raglans had got their go, and failed to balance their accounts, the crowd thought they could sniff trouble ahead for the leaguers. The second inning netted each side a goose egg, and the Saints drew an unnumbered check in their section of the third, but the locals warmed up, and with the assistance of half a dozen errors on the part of the collegians, scored four runs on three hits. Mt. Angel seemed to be satisfied with the one tally, and at the end of the ninth inning the Saints still had the lone mark to the credit. It was different with the Raglans, however, for they bought five in the fifth, repeated the dose in the sixth and were not satisfied until they had piled up seven in the seventh, a total of 21. The features of the game were a long running catch of a foul ball of third by Lougheed, a double play from Kelly to Hunt to Kincaid, a triple from Fay to Lougheed to Downie, and the fielding of "Si" Davis. The game was lacking in interest after the third inning, but the crowd weathered through the fiasco, and got the worth of their money. The teams were unevenly matched, but the Raglans played superb ball all the way through, and the visitors, while not in shape, are gentlemen, and never once entered an objection to a decision or growled about the final result. NOW A GOOD INDIAN

Louis Savage Murders Foster Wachino at Grand Ronde Reservation

Sheridan, Or., April 25.—Reports have reached here of a shooting scrape between Indians at the Grand Ronde reservation, as a result of which Foster Wachine was killed by Louis Savage.

Savage had been drinking with another Indian, when a quarrel sprung up, during which Savage drew a revolver. Wachine interfered to prevent him from using it, and received a bullet through the heart for his trouble.

As soon as the affair was reported to Dr. Kershan, the Indian agent, a warrant was sworn out, and Sheriff Sitton, with two deputies, left Sheridan this morning to capture Savage. As Savage is a bad man they are prepared for a fight.

Savage served a term in the state penitentiary for robbing Ellis Bros. store at Grand Ronde. He is one of the bad characters of the agency, and capable of the most cold-blooded criminal acts.
