

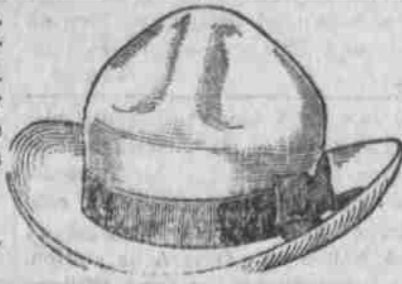

## FATAL ENGINE EXPLOSION

### Locomotive on B. & O. Blows up Killing People and Damages Property

Pittsburg, Pa., April 27.—An engine on the Baltimore & Ohio railroad exploded this morning as it was passing Braddock, fatally injuring Engineer Hunter and Fireman Fred Deagle and seriously injuring three others. Five buildings were wrecked by the explosion, and two set on fire.

### Judge Scott Addresses Meeting of Grange at Turner Today

The Marion county Grange met at Woodburn this morning, and will hold sessions this afternoon and evening. Hon. John H. Scott went down today, and will deliver a good roads talk this afternoon.

The people of the valley are commencing to realize that it will be necessary to agitate the subject before practical results can be obtained, and they propose to hear discussions from men like Judge Scott, who has made a study of the entire question.
