

TURNER HELD BLAMELESS

Legal Technicality Lets Murderer Keady's Friend Down Easy

Corvallis Citizens Are Indignant Over-Turn of Affairs and Make Om-nious Threats

Corvallis, Or., April 28.—Bert Turner was arraigned before Judge Holgate yesterday, as being an accessory of Murderer Keady, in the killing of James Dunn and wounding ex-Sheriff Osburn. Turner was sentenced to 50 days in the county jail and \$10 fine, the only charge preferred against him being that of carrying a concealed weapon.

E. B. Bryson, prosecuting attorney, states:

"The wording of the law in regard to an accessory to a crime is such that while I am confident, as is almost everyone, that Turner is morally responsible for the death of James Dunn, yet, under the circumstances, as brought out by the witnesses, he is not legally liable as an accessory."

"Turner admits giving Keady the revolver, but states, and is corroborated by other witnesses, that it was for the purpose of protecting himself in a proposed row with Vineyard. If Keady shot Vineyard then Turner would have been legally an accessory. But as he shot Osburn and Dunn, two entirely different parties, he is released from liability."

"He admits giving cartridges to Keady after shooting Osburn, but his statement, corroborated by Byron Taylor, an unimpeachable witness, is that, as they walked away after the shooting of Osburn, Keady demanded that he give him all the cartridges he had, and upon being refused pointed the revolver at Turner's head saying, 'You — — —, if you don't give them to me, I will shoot the top of your head off.' The necessary evidence that Turner assisted or encouraged Keady in the shooting of either Dunn or Osburn is not forthcoming, hence the trivial nature of the charge against him."

From the conversation heard between groups of determined citizens it will be well for Turner to leave for other scenes as soon as released from jail. Henry Dunn, a brother of the murdered man, says: "I want to see him turned loose, and want to hear him make some break; I'll guarantee that surgeons will not be probing for lodged bullets."

The stern declaration of this ordinarily law-abiding citizen is a fair sample of the feeling of the outraged community.

EDDY AND BURNETT WIN OUT.

A Fairly Accurate Account of the Judgeship Battle.

The nomination of B. L. Eddy for circuit judge in the Third judicial district was a big surprise. The nomination of George H. Burnett, though doubtful, was predicted Wednesday evening by those who were familiar with the preferences of many of the delegates. The nomination of Eddy was unexpected, because he had the initial support of a delegation of only five members from his own county. His strength lay in the fact that he had no particular opposition, and delegates from Linn county sup-

ported him because they wanted neither Burnett or McCain. The contest is which Burnett and Eddy won was one of the most interesting of the convention. The vote was: Burnett, 42; Eddy, 38; McCain, 24; Wyatt, 21; Adams, 1.

The five counties had delegates as follows: Marion, 23; Linn, 14; Yamhill, 11; Polk, 9; Tillamook, 5. So far as can be learned Burnett secured his 42 votes as follows: Marion, 17; Yamhill, 11; Polk, 9; Marion, 8; Tillamook, 5. Polk and Tillamook went solid for Wyatt and Eddy; Yamhill went solid for McCain and Burnett and Marion scattered its vote among each of the candidates.

The effort of the Linn delegation was to make a trade with Yamhill and thus secure a start of 25 votes for Wyatt and McCain. But Yamhill delegates would not go to Wyatt, but preferred Burnett. The whole 11 therefore went to Burnett and in return 13 of Marion's delegates voted for McCain. Wyatt's delegation was angry because no deal could be made with McCain and went to Eddy to get even. Eddy wasn't in a trade of any kind, and had to give nothing for the 14 votes he got from Linn. Polk had no candidate and supported the man most acceptable to the delegation. The withdrawal of Hart from the race for district attorney made it impossible for Linn and Yamhill to make a combination that could win, even if Yamhill could have been traded away from Burnett.

In connection with the withdrawal of Hart for the district attorneyship there is told a story of good political management. Although J. H. McNary, who captured the district attorneyship, repeatedly asserted that he would not seek the nomination as long as Hart remained a candidate, he was frequently mentioned as a passive candidate.

Hart was a pronounced candidate until a few days ago. Last Saturday McNary announced his own candidacy and was accused of infidelity to Hart, under whom he served as a deputy. It now develops that there had been an understanding between Hart and McNary for four years, by which McNary stayed out of the race in 1900 and Hart dropped out this year. Hart made the race this year for the purpose of keeping out other candidates and at the proper time he withdrew, leaving McNary to take the nomination without opposition. If Hart had withdrawn a month ago there would have been a dozen candidates for the place. It therefore appears that McNary was not a candidate against Hart, though outward appearances indicated that he was. McNary had been deputy prosecuting attorney in Marion county for eight years, and is well acquainted in each of the five counties of his district. McMinnville News.

ESTIMATE OF CATTLE LOSSES.

Winter Has Proven Disastrous in Counties Farther East.

Compared with the loss of stock in eastern counties of the state, Waco and its neighboring counties have been fortunate this winter. Here's what the Democrat says of the loss in Umatilla, Baker, Malheur and others:

"The winter just passed was the hardest winter on stock which Eastern Oregon has experienced in a number of years. Despite the fact that the conditions were most favorable during the fore part of the winter and up till the first of March the last months of the season brought disaster to the stockmen. While last spring it was estimated by authoritative cattlemen that the average loss would not exceed 5 per cent the lowest and some place it as high as 25 per cent.

"The mountain districts have suffered more than any other. In the

lowlands the cattle were able to live on almost nothing if they did not have to contend against snow and storms, but in the mountain districts they perished by hundreds in the storms. In the Susanville districts the reports are to the effect that the loss will be as high as 25 per cent and also the same in the foothills of the Blue mountains in Umatilla county. From other sections the losses reported are not so great. A number of prominent stock men attended the conventions in the city and it has been possible to gather a very accurate estimate of the loss during this winter.

"The cause of this great loss was the backward spring. The cattle were turned on the ranges at the usual time but the cold weather prevented

the grass from growing and consequently the cattle died of starvation. As soon as the owners discovered this condition they immediately began shipping feed where it was possible to do so, but in many instances there was no feed to ship in and no way to ship and so the cattle were left to rustle for themselves as best they could, the result being that thousands of them died before the spring grass started. The cattlemen were just last during the fore and middle part of the winter on account of the promising prospects. It looked then as if the stock would get through in fine shape and with but little feeding. This proved to be the case until time to put the stock on the range, when the unfavorable weather set in, which caused all the loss."
