Drummers Trying to Elect a Sheriff in Multnomah County

The commercial men who have their headquarters in Portland will take an active part in Politics in Multnomah county this year, according to the many reports that are current. The traveling men have one of their number on the Democratic ticket, and propose to elect him, or know the reason why. Tom Word is the drummer who has aspirations to fill a political office, and he wants the sheriff's job. The Republicans turned down Sheriff Storey, and nominated Jas. Stott. The Democrats named Word, the Socialist-Labor people put Nat Bird, and now Storey is out as an Independent Republican candidate. Bird made the race two years ago, and was a close finisher, but the labor vote was closely united at that time, and it is thought that he polled more votes than he can do now. Storey is extremely confident that he will be elected, the Republican machine is willing to bet on Stott, and the drummers are raising heaven and earth for Word. They are contributing a campaign fund, and it is said that almost every employe in the wholesale district has donated to it. Every knight of the road will be in Portland on election day, if possible, and men who have not voted for years will act as ward heelers and challengers. One traveling man, who was at the Willamette recently, said: "Tom Word is a sure winner, and we are going down the line with him almost to a man. We want some recognition, and if we cannot get it in any other way we will fight for it. We have plenty of funds, and we know where to get more, if we need them. So here goes for the next sheriff of Multnomah county."
