CREAM SUPPLY SHORT

E. J. Seely, a Prominent Valley Creamery Man Discusses Conditions

E. J. Seely, one of the leading creamery men of Oregon, is in the city. Mr. Seely was superintendent of the first creamery started in Linn county, over nine years ago, and has been actively engaged in the business ever since. He is owner of the Albany Butter & Produce creamery at the present time, and is part owner of the new milk condensing plant now under construction at North Bend, Coos county.

In speaking of the dairy and creamery industries he said: "The supply of cream this spring is short of what it has been in former years. This is due in part to the late, cold spring, but there are other causes. The farmers have sold off a great many cows, although the price of butter fat has been at the top notch for several years. At the present time the price of butter is high, averaging the dairyman about 22½ cents a pound. The price of wheat and hay has lessened the number of cows and turned the attention of the farmers to raising such products, as it is less work and almost as remunerative as milking cows. The general prosperity of the producing class is responsible for the shortage of milk, and the creameries are suffering, but they have no recourse."

Mr. Seely expects to spend part of the time in Coos county, but will continue to operate his Albany creamery.

Certificate of Probable Cause.

Chief Justice Moore yesterday granted a certificate of probable cause in the case of James G. Lee, of Washington county, who was sentenced to serve four years in the penitentiary for the larceny of a calf. Hon. Henry E. McGinn, of Portland, is the attorney for appellant. This action of the supreme court stays the execution of the penalty until the appeal is determined.
