

RAGLANS WIN THEIR FIRST LEAGUE GAME

Roseburg Mountaineers Are Out-Played in Bat Battle That Had Some Exciting Spots

No lowering clouds with aqueous fillings marred the heavens yesterday, nor spilled their contents on the earth beneath, as of the day before.

It was an ideal time for baseball, with just enough ozone glimmer in the atmosphere to put one and one-half dozen ambitious ball tossers in the right frame of mind and muscle to go out upon the diamond, and play the game right up to the very bat handle.

And the best of it all was that the "Raglans" outplayed the "Mountaineers" from one end of the lot to the other, and they left the field as easy victors in their first league game of the season.

Salem 4, Roseburg 1, and the story, as far as league game averages go, is told. There are features, however, that even the score book will not reveal to the inquisitive in the future. The steady, cool playing of the Raglans, working like a machine, and the splendid pitching of Gregory, in the face of rank support at critical times, were worthy of admiration.

Roseburg went to bat, and "Pap" Morrow rolled a little one to Califf, who stopped to fondle it, and the result was that the Mountaineer preempted the first station. Newell failed to dodge, and was presented with a base as a result of his wounded feelings, forcing Morrow to second. Bradley connected with the horsehide for a short one to Loughed, who threw Newell out on second, Morrow reaching third. Bradley started for second, and Wilkins threw the ball to Downie, who came in on it, and returned it at once to the home plate, catching Morrow just as he was about to score. N. Oswell paddled the sunny April atmosphere, and the side retired.

Fay made a safe hit to start the ball rolling. Wilkins got first on an error by Oswell, who juggled a dinky hit. Loughed hit safe, but Fay got caught at the final bag. Davis was thrown out at first by Oswell, on a little hunt that rolled around the catcher's feet, and Suess struck out.

Miller fanned. Nadler reached first on an error of Loughed's, but afterwards got caught asleep at second, and Millington went out at first. Wilner and Nehring failed to reach first, and Downie sent one up into the sky, which was welcome food for the mountaineer catcher.

Oswell could not connect and retired. Gregory shot a fast grounder to Downie, and failed to reach first, and Morrow was forced out at second by Newell, after he had made a safe single.

Salem started the run getting in this inning, that is the Mountaineers presented them with amark. Califf reached first on an error by Newell. Fay followed suit by one of Bradley's similar stunts. Wilkins was fielded out at first, and Califf scored on a fielder's choice, unearthed by Loughed. Davis and Suess went out by co-operation of Gregory and Morrow.

The fourth inning Roseburg did not have a look-in coming, for Bradley and N. Oswell were tossed out at first by

Califf, and the bat was not long enough for Miller to find the twist. Wilner waited for good ones, and they did not come, so the umpire gave him a ticket to first. Nehring and Califf were cut short in one-two-three order. Downie waited the sphere for a single. Fay reposed for a time on first through the apparent kindness of Morrow, but really owing to an off-side throw by Bradley. Wilkins drove out a clean single that enabled Wilner and Downie to cross the rubber, and Loughed was put out at first.

C. Oswell made a two-bagger in the fifth, but he died an unhappy death at third waiting for something to turn up. Nadler touched an easy one right into the pitcher's box, and was fielded out to Nehring. Millington and Gregory drew blanks. Errors by Nadler and Bradley gave Salem another run in this inning, but that was the end of their fun.

The sixth was uneventful, but in the seventh, with two men out, Reed, who had been substituted for Millington, picked out a vacant spot in the out garden, and landed a nice two-timer, to be followed a moment later by a hot grass-scorcher from the bat of C. Oswell, that could not be handled until the former had completed the circuit, and the latter was safely hugging third. Everybody thought that the time for the fireworks was at hand, but Gregory failed to unravel Califf's continuous story, and the visitors' chance for a victory went a glimmering.

The ninth inning was anything but tame. N. Oswell struck out. Miller's number was pretty short, and he was saved the trouble of running bases, but Nadler touched Califf for a one-bagger, and Reed went to first on an error by Loughed. The local fans held their breath, and "Pap" Morrow, prayer. It was a good, earnest imploration, but the old saw, "the prayers etc., avaleth not," was fully demonstrated, for Oswell flew out to Wilner, and the first league game of the season was at an end.

The two teams are well matched, and neither have a license to win, judging from the work on the diamond yesterday. Salem shows superior team work, and plays in a little better form, but the Mountaineers are a hardy lot, and bat like fiends. Gregory, their south paw, throws a very peculiar ball, and is hard to find. Califf pitched a fine game, and was well supported. The score:
