

MISSOURI MEN ARE EXONERATED

Officers and Crew of Ill Fated Battleship Highly Commended by Court of Inquiry

Washington, D. C., May 4.—The text of the finding of the court of inquiry into the Missouri disaster has been made public. The cause of the accident was the unexpected ignition of two sections of charges of smokeless powder then in the gun and by "flare back" flames which ignited two of the sections in the ammunition car and a shower of burning powder projected down to the twelve inch gun handling room, igniting eight other sections of smokeless powder. The accident was in no respect due to fault or negligence on the part of the officers or crew.

PREACHER TURNS GAMBLER

Believes He Was Inspired by the Almighty to Play Roulette and Recoup His Fallen Fortunes

Butte, Mont., May 4.—Unable to earn enough money to support his wife and two children in his chosen profession, the Rev. Dr. C. E. Henderson, a Methodist minister, turned gambler, and was more fortunate with the fickle goddess.

Dr. Henderson, with his family, have started for California to "start life over again," as he says.

The preacher lost his church in Salt Lake City more than a year ago because of his age, and moved to this place. Here he was unable to get a pulpit, and he was forced to take any kind of work he could obtain. He did jobs in the kitchens of all the Butte hotels, washed dishes and peddled, but the money he received was not sufficient to support the three dependent upon him. He went to the employment office yesterday, where, for over a year he has been a steady caller. He was so changed that it was with difficulty that he was recognized. His appearance was exactly opposite of what it was 10 days ago.

"I am going away from here," said Dr. Henderson. "I turned gambler for a short time, and have won enough money to take us all to California. I was desperate a few days ago, and I took the last dollar I had into a gambling establishment, where there was a roulette game. I put it on the red, and it won. I left it there and again I won. Then I tried the others, and did not fall to win with any combination.

"It seemed that I could not lose, and when I quit playing I had \$1500 to start life over again. It might have been wrong, but I don't think it was. God must have put it into my head to try roulette as the last resort after my efforts in every other direction had failed.

Miss Bouilliard's Funeral.
The funeral services of the late Miss Lizzie Bouilliard were held at the home on East State street yesterday noon, Rev. P. S. Knight officiating. Many floral tributes were offered, and an abundance of flowers were taken to the grave. It was one of the most largely attended funerals held in some time in Salem, and, while the service was simple, it was most impressive. Frank Bouilliard, a brother of the deceased, came from Chico, Cal., but Charles and Mrs. Balmer, who reside at Nome, could not be present. The remains were laid to rest in the family lot at Lee Mission cemetery.
