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SCHEMES TO PLEASE SCHOLARS

**Suggestions for Pedagogues
That Will Provide Amusement
for Their
Pupils**

"Duty before pleasure" and "All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy," are familiar to us all. It is well to have a due proportion and the very best of each if possible. "Play" is going to come first in order this time. There are many kinds of play which are of little or no value to the participants—other and better should be put in their places. In the first place, what is play? Its object and place in our lives? Perhaps some one will give an interesting answer through your columns.

There are several games which I should like to give for the benefit of pupils and teachers. An indoor game which for lack of a better name we will call "Letters," is very interesting and instructive for half an hour or so on a Friday afternoon. It is played with cards, which are about an inch square, on one side of each of which is printed one letter of the alphabet. They may be bought or "home made." There should be more of some letters, as "a," "b," "c," "e," and others, and less of some as "x," "z," and others. The cards are placed "letters down" in the center of the table, around which the players are seated. The game may be geography names, names of authors, titles of books, nouns or adjectives; perhaps some may be able to add to this list, which makes a "profitable" game.

One player turns up a card and places it immediately where all can see it, and each of the other players gives a geography name, if it is a geography game, beginning with the letter on the card as soon as possible. The one giving a name first, each name can be given only once during the game, is the winner of the card. Then the one to the left turns up another card and all try to give a name first again, and so on until the game is closed. The one having the greatest number of cards is the winner of the game. The interest is often intense and the benefit in making the pupils familiar with geography names and in making them think quickly can easily be seen. After the pupils begin to lay up a "stock supply" of easy and familiar names, let them be put on a list of "excluded names;" for instance, Astoria for "a," Portland for "p."

Wolf and Deer—A rather small "court" is marked off. This deer are scattered around. One or both wolves may go out and "touch" a deer which must then go into the court and remain until touched by a free deer. After a prisoner is taken, unless he sees it is perfectly safe to leave the prisoner deer and go after another, one wolf remains on guard to prevent another deer touching him, for if another deer does touch the prisoner he is free again to leave the court. The object is to get all the deer into the enclosure if possible. It is a good outdoor game.

"Pennsylvania" or "Many Motions," either an in or outdoor game—Choose sides. One side thinks of something as chopping wood, sowing grain, wringing out clothes, etc. Then they go within a reasonable close distance to the other side and make motions all together, to represent the subject taken.

en. The other side tries to guess. The side making motions must stand ready to run to their own base the minute the right thing is guessed or named. The side guessing follows and, if possible, takes prisoners from the fleeing side.

The one touched becomes a member of the other side.

Nine pins—This is one of the best and most wide-awake of outdoor games. Choose sides. Place two rows of sharpened pins about a foot long, nine in a each, about 30 feet apart, opposite each other. Put the bases about seven feet from the pins and outside of them. The point in this game is to take all the pins from the opposing side, if possible, the side having the larger number at the close wins. A player from one side makes a "dare," takes a pin if he can get it and not get caught himself, but if while he is making the dare or getting the pin an "enemy" touches him a pin has to be given from his side to the enemy. If he gets his hand on the pin first they cannot touch him. If he is chased back those on his side, one or more, must rush out after the chaser and prevent him from touching his fleeing partner and at the same time must look out sharply to see that no one from the enemy's side who left the base after he did is after him, for only the one leaving the base last can tag or touch the other; any one can take a pin provided he can get it, no matter how long he has been from his base. The one taking a pin out of the enemy's row is just a little the greater victor than the one who wins one by touching one of the enemies. Those on the base must

be on the alert to see that none of their side are caught by the enemy. They must be quick to defend the ing partner. It is important to have a member who left the base last. This is one of the finest outdoor games not only for school, but for the "yard" on pleasant spring or summer evenings.

To Fight Wine Adulteration.

Buffalo, N. Y., May 6.—The regular convention of the recently organized American Wine Growers' association will meet in this city from today. It is expected that by that time the entire American wine trade will be represented. The inception of the movement for the organization of the American wine growers and for the maintenance of the purity of American wines, California growers got the impression that the eastern growers, who constituted the majority of the association, were hostile to them. The association has taken a stand against adulteration of American wines, and against their sale under foreign labels. Its officers believe that America can produce good wines as any other country in the world, and that the only way to protect the trade can be built up is by selling the wines for exactly what they are. A determined effort also be made to suppress the adulterators, and to secure the passage of stringent laws against the adulteration of native wines.
