Committees Appointed on Red Fire and Enthusiasm

About Two Hundred Roosevelt Boomers Will Go to the Killing on French Prairie

The working Republicans of this city held a meeting last night to complete arrangements to send two carloads of enthusiasts to Woodburn Saturday night.

There was never greater enthusiasm in the rank and file of the party organization, and this is especially noticeable among the younger Republicans, who are lining up for the whole ticket as never before.

The indications are that two hundred Roosevelt men will go to Woodburn Saturday night and participate in the great demonstration made there for the whole ticket.

Joint Meeting Last Night.
The joint meeting of the Young Men's Republican Club and the Roosevelt League at the police court room was well attended, and an encourage-

ing enthusiasm was manifested. A committee of five, consisting of H. D. Patton, Capt. C. A. Murphy, John Knight, James Kyle and Mr. Melvin, was appointed on "noise and red fire." Incidentally, this committee will look after the financial contributions necessary for the excursion, will arrange for the band, for a flambeau club, and will have coupons printed and placed on sale today.

These coupons, which will be exchangeable for railroad tickets, will be on sale after 10 o'clock today at Patton's book store, Burghardt's book store, Water's cigar store and Wiprut's cigar store. Everyone that intends going should buy a coupon today early, so the committee will know, more or less, how many are going, so as to provide a sufficient number of cars.

After this was attended to Chairman Dr. J. N. Smith, called on Mr. Frank Davey for a few remarks, and he was followed by E. Hofer, John Knight and others in short but pointed and pithy speeches.

The affair at Woodburn will be a grand success, and the boys who go from here will carry a lot of good cheer and enthusiasm to the Republicans at Woodburn.

Of his preparation the Musical Courier has the following notice at the hands of its Berlin correspondent:

"William Graham, of Portland, Ore., has just returned home after seven years of study here, spent chiefly at the Hochschule under Hallr and Joachim, who have both spoken and written very highly of the young American. I heard him play when he arrived seven years ago, and I heard him again a few days ago. His progress has been enormous. He was nothing when he came, and today he is an artist. He draws a pure, sweet tone, he has a fluent and very clear technique, and he has good, healthy ideas of interpretation. Graham is, moreover, a fine fellow. Portland may well be proud of having a violinist of his calibre."
