### New Japanese Loan.

## POPE'S LETTER TO FRANCE

### Makes a Protest at President Loubet's Coldness

Paris, May 10.—The Patrie today published the text of the pope's letter to Loubet, in which his holiness takes exceptions to the president's neglect of the Vatican during his trip to Rome. It is an energetic and dignified protest against Loubet's neglect of the pontiff, as Christ's vicar on earth. Continuing his holiness deplores the anti-clerical movement in Europe and expresses the hope that the church's prestige will be restored. The letter concludes with an exhortation to Loubet as a "Dear Son in Christ," to use his power and his authority and his personal magnanimity to maintain the concord integrally.

### ARMY MAJOR SHOT

By Colored Cavalryman Whose Whereabouts are Not Known.

Monterey, Cal., May 10.—Regimental Major E. A. McKenzie, of the 15th United States Infantry, stationed at Camp Ord, was fatally shot about midnight, and officers are now hunting for his assassin, who is said to be a member of Campay A, 9th colored cavalry, who was heard to state earlier in the evening that he would kill his victim if he met him. His assailant fired from a dark alley.

### ST. LOUIS HEATED AIR.

German Section Opened, and Weather Continues Fair.

St. Louis, May 10.—Germany's sections of the palace of fine arts was dedicated this afternoon, when a reception was held by the commissioner-general, Lewald. Fair weather continues. Work was begun this morning on the building for the aerial exhibit. Twelve acres are allotted. There are 55 entries for airship contests thus far.

### Life Was All Moonshine.

Blackfoot, Idaho, May 10.—Herman A. Mondschein, a prominent local jeweler, committed suicide, taking prussic acid. He had been drinking for some days. He left a brother in Washington, D. C., and a sister in Germany.

Eight hundred bookbinders struck today at Chicago for recognition of the closed shop agreement. It is threatened to spread the strike to other branches of the printing trades.

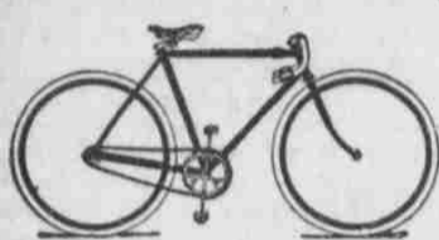
