

FRUIT GROWERS' UNION

Employ a Manager to Open Better Markets for Their Products

There was a large meeting of the Fruit Union Saturday at the warehouse of the Capital Commission company, on South Commercial street. All the officers were present, including the board of directors and secretary Jas. M. Kyle. The proceedings of the meeting were very satisfactory, and the 40 members present, representing nearly 20 acres of cherries, strawberries and other small fruits unanimously endorsed the action of the board of directors in selecting a secretary, and deciding to pay him a salary and expenses for

time actually employed looking after the interests of the growers. Mr. Kyle, under direction of the board, left Sunday morning for Puget Sound and other places to learn the conditions of the trade, and find openings for the large Salem crop. The union proposes to fight for a better market, and will make arrangements to ship large quantities of berries direct to the trade in the larger centers of distribution. A committee on the good of the union was appointed, consisting of W. C. Price, Grover Hemsley and H. Bartholomew.

The members propose to adopt a plan similar to other unions, of protecting their members, and dealing only with firms that sell the Union product. The price for admission to membership was reduced to \$1.00, and the members are all to canvass their neighbors and get them into the Union. There was strong expression of sentiment against selling berries to the Salem cannery at three cents a pound. At this price the grower cannot make any money, and the Union proposes to ship elsewhere if they have to take that price.

Indian War Veterans Meet.

The annual meeting of Bennett Camp, No. 8, Indian War Veterans, was held last Saturday, at the city hall, and several important measures adopted. Wm. Townsend was elected captain, and Col. Shaw, of Vancouver, was recommended for grand commander. It was also resolved that the camp attend the grand encampment as delegates.

YOUNG WOMAN CHOSEN

Salem Woman's Club Elects Officers and Creates Library Board

For the first time in the history of the organization a young woman has been chosen president of the Salem Woman's Club, Miss Moore being a popular young society leader, and succeeds Mrs. Cusick, who succeeded Mrs. Geer. The election was held Saturday, and extended into the late hours of the afternoon, in the parlors of the First Presbyterian church and officers were elected for the ensuing year as follows: President, Miss Callista Moore; vice-president, Mrs. R. J. Hendricks; secretary, Mrs. A. A. Lee; assistant secretary, Mrs. A. W. Prescott; treasurer, Mrs. L. S. Lyon; board of directors, Mrs. R. B. Houston, Mrs. C. E. Wolverton and Miss Lillian Applegate.

The report of the library committee was received, showing that several hundred volumes of good books, and numerous periodicals had already been subscribed for the reading room, which is to be fitted up in the city hall. The club created a separate organization to be known as the Salem Public Library Association. The officers are a president and six trustees, who are elected annually by the Salem Woman's Club. This board of trustees has charge of the library, and will elect a secretary, treasurer and librarian. The officers chosen yesterday were: President, Mrs. C. L. Bristol-Kellher; trustee, Mrs. L. A. Morse, Mrs. P. H. Raymond, Mrs. Geo. Irwin, Mrs. Alice Traver, Mrs. F. W. Waters and Mrs. T. T. Geer.

A comprehensive set of by laws was adopted giving the duties of each officer of the association, and the manner in which the library is to be conducted, fees to be charged, etc. The Salem club has had a very prosperous existence, and for the past year has identified itself with several progressive movements, among them being a public library, pictures in the public schools, and higher grades in the public schools. No city in the state has a more substantial class of women in this movement, and they are exerting an influence the community has very much needed.

The association expects to have everything in readiness for an opening next Friday evening. A short program will be arranged at the city hall, and the public is cordially invited to come. Those having books to donate to the library are requested to send them in this week, or kindly notify the association, and the books will be sent for.

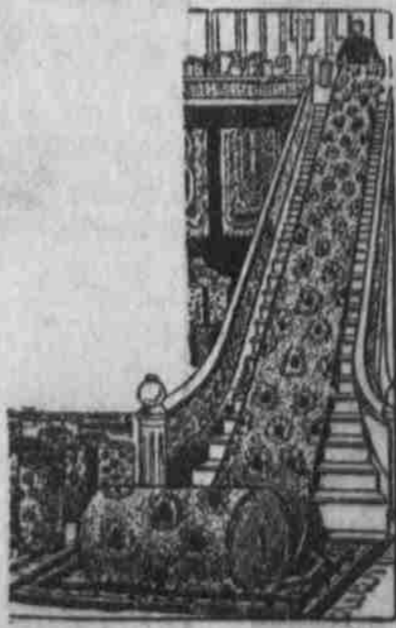
