WINE OF CARDUI

BOARD WAS NOT PLEASED

Action of the Council Last Night Did Not Suit Park Improvers

City council met in an adjourned session last night to consider the improvement plans of the public parks. Mrs. D. J. Fry and William Manning, members of the park board, were present, and for a time there was an animated discussion over the advisability of adopting the plans presented by the board.

Mr. Manning spoke first, showing the proposed improvements, both in Marion square and Wilson avenue. He said the ladies had raised several hundred dollars to beautify Marion square, and expected to raise more. All that the city was asked to do was to build a cement curb along the Commercial-street side of the square, and assist in putting in a decomposed granite walk, according to the specifications before the council. The plans call for a zig-zag walk, curving in from each corner to the center, where the fountain will be erected. The ladies have built the band stand, and purchased new cast-iron lovers seats for the use of persons who desire to avail themselves of the privilege of strolling through the park. About \$500 is in the hands of the ladies for the erection of the fountain, and they expect to add an equal amount to that. The park board did not ask the city to expend another cent of money, but they desired the council to adopt the plans officially, and thus ratify the action of the board.

Mr. Manning also explained the improvements under consideration for Wilson avenue. The board had made arrangements to lay drain tile under the surface and to construct a walk from Cottage street, opposite the post-office, to the walk in front of the state house.

Alderman Bayne moved that the Marion square plans be adopted, but Alderman Gesner moved to refer the matter to the park committee, and the latter motion carried. Several members of the council expressed themselves as favoring the plans, but they said it would require some time to examine the proposed walks and improvements, and they desired to familiarize themselves with the work before voting for it.

Mr. Manning felt that the council lacked in confidence in the park board and was about to hand in his resignation, when the situation was explained to him, and, on motion of Alderman Downing, the plans for Wilson avenue were adopted.

The question of what the park board intended doing about the proposed Woodmen carnival was up for discussion, the council evidently believing that the board would attempt to block the lodge from using the avenue for carnival purposes. Mr. Manning stated that he thought that the council had ignored the park board unlawfully, but, as long as they were in the hole, he, for one, would assist them to get out, and would not oppose the grant. Mrs. Fry was not as specific in her declarations concerning the course that pursue, but from the tenor of her remarks it might be inferred that she, too, was willing to allow the matter to drop without any trouble.

The council adjourned until May 27th, at which time the new sanitary ordinance will be discussed.
