WAGEWORKERS PLAN

FOR ORGANIZATION.

Members of Various Crafts Will Build up Unions by Taking in Men From Interior Towns-Carpenters Form New East Side

Portland Journal: Labor union men report that there will be greater activity in organization during the coming summer than for several years part. They declare that the conclusion has been reached that the only effective way in which the industrial conditions can be bettered is to see that all the wage earners are unionized, and the quicker this done the sooner will the desired results be re-

To carry this idea into execution the International Barbers' union has promised to put a state organizer in the local field. It is said that in all probability a Portland man will be chosen for the position. Prominent members of the union say that in all probability E. O. Mayor will be appointed to the position. They state that he has been an energetic worker in the ranks of unionism for years; that he is capable and understands the movement in all all its details, and his selection would meet with the enthe approval of everyone interested in the matter.

The barbers are introducing another plan that they believe will redound to their benefit. It is also in the line of organization, but in all material respects it is entirely different from the usual mode of procedure. In any town in the state that has not enough barbers to form a union of their own it is the intention to induce them to become affiliated with the Portland ocal Before an independent union can be established it is necessary to have 10 charter members. Not that many barbers are found in a large number of the interior towns; some of them have all the way from one to nine. In all places of this description organizers will be sent for the purpose of persuading them to become affillated with the Portland organization. A substantial start has already been made in this direction. Although in another state, the barbers of V. couver, Wash., have made application to join the local union, and it is said that their wishes will be comolied with. By the time all the small towns are taken into the fold under the same plan it is said that the membership of the Portland union will be increased by several hundred.

The carpenters are also unusually active in the line of organization. Last night they formed a new local on the East Side, making the second union organized across the river during the ast few weeks. Threre are now three local carpenters' unions, the third being on this side of the river. When they all get in good working order and a fairly strong membership it is the intention to form what will be known as the district council. This will be made up of delegates sent from each of the three locals. It will be the central body of the Portland carpenters, and will direct the industrial affairs of all the mechanics following the trade. When they become thoroughly organized it is the intention of the carpenters to make an effort to reestablish the eight-hour day in certain localities, and bring the wage scale up to a higher level.

An organizer for the cigarmakers is expected to arrive in the city in a few days who will devote some time to looking after the interests of the craft. But it is not thought likely that he will remain in the field for any great length of time. The cigar makers state that they are already pretty thoroughly organized, and just now they are giving more attention to other matters.
