We mean the gentlemen voters. Look the situation square in the eye, and see what is the best thing to do under all circumstances.

THE WAR ON JUDGE SCOTT.

The fact is he is not fighting Scott on his record, but to boom the Prohibition mayor of Woodburn, and have him ride in on the moral wave of insinuations that Scott is not all right.

Grant Corby is a clean man and a good mayor of Woodburn, and the idol of the Woodburn Prohibitionists, but he is not running on that ticket. He is running as the Democratic candidate.

But if he is elected that element will claim the victory, and he will be the Prohibition county judge, and that is what is back of the Woodburn Independent man's support of Corby.

THE COMING SCHOOL ELECTION.

Salem people must not forget the school election on the third Monday in June.

A director is to be elected and the district will vote whether any grades above the ninth grade shall be taught in our public schools.

The entire educational interests of the city are at stake in this matter.

To take a step backward or a negative step, when other communities are going forward, would injure any city before the whole state.

Libraries have been put in the schools, good pictures hung, and a tenth grade added, without increasing taxes.

Under a city superintendent about 200 have been added to the attendance, and all schools in Salem are flourishing.

The friends of the public schools

should not go back on this kind of progress, when it has been made.

Every college and higher institution of learning will be helped by better and higher grade public schools.

Hundreds of young men and young women are now turned out of our public schools almost as children, with the idea that their education is completed.

Many get the idea that when they have completed the present Salem public schools they are ready to teach school, and do teach.

At the coming school election let the people of Salem express themselves on this matter in no uncertain manner for progressive public schools.

THE MARION COUNTY CANVASS.

The usual joint canvass of the county opens at Turner and in the evening at Jefferson.

The battle royal will be very tame this year, as there are but few speakers on either side.

Judge Scott will handle the county affairs, and will be met by Grant Corby for the Democrats. That will be a hot fight.

The Republican legislative ticket has several good speakers, as T. B. Kay, of Salem, and John Ritchie, of Scotts Mills. J. G. Graham and J. H. Settlemeier will also be found to make good square business talks.

August Huckestein is a forcible speaker on the Democratic side, and will lead the attack on the Republican legislative ticket.

Tom Kay's experience and skill as a debater will make him easily the fighting man of the bunch, and he will more than hold his own in the tongue-lashing contest.

A SOUVENIR OF IOWA.

From the editor's native city comes a sample copy of the Dubuque Daily Telegraph and Herald, the first printed on the new press, that is one of those marvels of perfection and rapidity that we read about, gaze upon with wonder and utterly fail to comprehend the mechanism thereof.

The same paper contains a history of Iowa journalism, starting with the first paper printed in the lead mines of that place, The Du Buque Visitor, Du Buque Lead Mines, Territory of Wisconsin, May 11, 1834. From that time down to the present the fair city on the Mississippi has enjoyed continuous growth and prosperity and the newspapers have shared in the development. By sheer ability the Telegraph has absorbed the field in opposition to the Republicans in that part of the state, swallowed the old Democratic organ and now has the lead over all competitors. It is a remarkable fact that out of the Democratic stronghold in Iowa have come some of the shining lights of the nation's Republicanism, men like Senator Allison, Speaker Henderson, Judge Shiras and others. About Bad Whisky.

The old adage that all whisky is good, but some is better, was attacked yesterday before the food standards committee at the Hotel Wolcott by Colonel W. M. Thomas, of Kentucky, who declared that much of the whisky sold in the United States was unfit for human consumption.

Colonel Thomas said that the only really pure and healthful whisky was that made in the old-fashioned way and aged in casks. No whisky, he declared, was fit to drink until it was eight or ten years old, although the present bottling in bond allows it to be withdrawn for bottling after four years, and in the original packages it may be withdrawn at any time.

Much of the so-called better-class whisky sold now, Colonel Thomas said, was made from alcohol distilled from corn, filtered through charcoal to remove the fusel oil and other impurities, and mixed with about one-fifth of its volume of pure old Bourbon or rye whisky. Such a compound, he said, might not be positively injurious, but it could hardly be called pure whisky.

By far the greatest portion of the stuff sold as whisky, he declared, however, was made by taking Cologne spirits, coloring it artificially, and adding artificial essences, ethers and oils to imitate the taste and appearance of whisky. Such concoctions, Colonel Thomas said, were unfit for human use.
