## MADE THINGS LIVELY

### Washington County Republicans Hold All Day Meeting and Barbecue

(Special to The Journal.)

Cornelius, Or., May 26.—Yesterday was a gala day in this part of Washington county, and will long be remembered as a great Herman rally. The Republicans had a grand all-day meeting with a barbecue, magnificent speeches and Republican enthusiasm generally. Over 1000 people were assembled to hear Congressman Hermann and Chairman Toome both of whom made able addresses. Aside from these, all the county candidates appeared and spoke for themselves. Senator Malarkey, of Portland, was also present, and let the bird of freedom soar to its greatest heights. The whole day was one grand ovation, speech-making, visiting, hand-shaking, barbecue festivities, and a grand Republican family reunion, such as has not been known in this county in many years. Predictions are that Mr. Hermann will receive from 500 to 1000 majority in this county.

Senator Fulton and Congressman Hermann will speak at Dayton this afternoon and at Newberg tonight.
