LOCAL OPTION VERSUS HOP INDUSTRIES.

One phase of the effect of the proposed local option law upon the industries of Oregon seems to have

been lost sight of or not discussed, but it is one of vital importance and that is, its effect upon the hop industries of the state. Everybody acknowledges and points with pride to the great value of this industry to Oregon, and even the most conscientious Prohibitionist is not inclined to object to the business. It brings hundreds of thousands of dollars to our state and is adding untold wealth to our landed holdings. This is as it should be, and nobody would have it disturbed.

This brings to mind what was done in California several years ago, when local option was innocently forced upon unsuspecting people. Hop growers there have occasion to remember its effect and how it ruined hundreds of farmers engaged in the business. It was done this way. Large brewing concerns in the east hearing of the unfair local option maneuvers in that state simply decided not to buy any of the California hops. Local representatives of the eastern consumers had orders not to buy, and at the same time to "spot" every bale of such hops. The result was they found no market. Later the growers sent special agents east to find a market for their product, but these gentlemen were immediately referred back to California representatives of the big consumers, and positively could not sell a bale of their product. Some went so far as to take their hops out of the state and thus possibly smuggled a few bales onto the buyers, but train loads which were freighted into adjoining states were still spotted and turned down. They never found a market. The growers lost two crops in this way, and in most instances were compelled to give up the business. In Lake county it is claimed that every hop grower was bankrupted as a result. The brewers simply said they did not care to patronize people who foolishly, ignorantly and unjustly attack their line of business.

It is only natural to presume that these brewers would do the same to Oregon hop growers in case this state adopts the infamous meddling, business-destroying local option law, which must in the end be declared a failure and be removed from the statute book. Any one wishing to know more definitely concerning this matter, can do so by inquiring of any well-informed hop buyer in town, and it would not be a bad plan for every person interested in hop raising to look into this matter and be thoroughly posted as to the possible effect on their pocket books.

ROASTS SUBSCRIPTION PLAN.

If this county had to have a Democratic county judge, Grant Corby would probably be the best man the Democrats could name.

He is considered a clean man in every way and has more than the average intelligence of men engaged in local politics.

But he is mistaken in his attack on Judge Scott for favoring local subscriptions to build county roads.

THE COUNTY CANVASS.

Indications are that Marion county canvass will become very spirited before it is over.

In the fight for the county judgeship the brunt of the battle falls on County Judge Scott, and he seems able to meet it.

It is rather unusual for a county judge to be re-elected in Marion county, but the indications are that Scott will make the race all right.

He presents the record made by the Republican party in this county for the past four years in a very attractive manner.

The fight on the legislative ticket has not yet been centered on any one man in particular, although an effort has been made to attack Kay.

Kay is the best fighter on the ticket and probably best able to take care of himself. He plants himself on his record and says he does not want the election on any other basis.

As the campaign develops he will be found displaying the qualities of a good fighter with many resources if the fight is centered on him.

The Republicans will do well to watch the storm centers and scatter the fire of the opposition as much as possible. It is generally positive men who draw the fire of the enemy and that seems to be the case in this contest.

VAIN THRUSTS FROM WOODBURN

The editor of the Woodburn Independent started in to fight Judge Scott on his good roads record. One of his first statements happened to be very unfortunate, and he has changed his tactics. He related, with a gush of tears, that Judge Scott was throwing money away in Champoeg precinct on road work, and otherwise injuring the taxpayers in other sections. In fact his game seems to be to put section against section, precinct against precinct, and neighbor against neighbor. He found that it did not work, Judge Scott's flat rebuttal of his very specific charge made the undertaking of the gentleman at Woodburn a very discouraging piece of business, and he has "switched." Judge Scott's record along with the entire county court, for these gentlemen always work as a unit, is an open book, and cannot be successfully attacked by anyone. Being thus foiled in an attempt to twist an official's record to his disadvantage the Woodburn editor now turns his guns on the Capital Journal and the wicked man who edits the X-Ray column, and tells the dear people that they should not vote for Scott because Hofer is not supporting Corby. This is pretty good logic, coming from the Woodburn editor, perhaps as good as he is capable of, but the voters care little about his thrusts and threats. They know that Judge Scott has helped reduce Marion county expenses, has brought on a new era in public road making, and is today doing more for the real prosperity of Marion county than almost any other one man.

Journal, while he draws a government salary. Roosevelt's attention should be called to the action of this fellow, and he should either attend strictly to business or be ordered to quit the job.—Eugene Register.
