William Stewart died in this county in April, and his will was admitted to probate on the 16th day of that month. It named James A. Gibson as executor, and the bequests were as follows:

To Janet Graham, of Jamestown, Dunbartonshire, Scotland, the sum of \$500.

To John Stewart, a half brother, \$500.

To James Stewart, of Glasgow, Scotland, a brother, the residue of the estate.

To his wife Isabel Stewart, all the personal property, notes, cash and bonds at the time of the testator's death.

When the will was made the decedent owned a farm of considerable value in this county, but before his death the same was sold and the entire estate was converted into personal property.

The widow now seeks to have the will set aside as of no force and effect, and through her attorney, J. H. Bigger, asks for an order of the court to that effect. The citation is returnable on July 5th. There are no children or other heirs at law, and the widow, in her petition, alleges that the deceased was laboring under a misapprehension of facts concerning the laws of inheritance and descent in the state at the time he made the will, and was in poor and feeble health, and such would render him incompetent and unfit to transact such important business. The case will be watched with interest, as the amount involved is sure to lead to a hard fight on both sides of the controversy.

One Divorce Granted

Pearl Stanton was granted a divorce from her husband, Harry O. Stanton, yesterday afternoon on the grounds of desertion. Mrs. Stanton was the defendant but filed a cross-bill and secured a divorce, and the care and custody of the only child, aged three years. A lot in Eola was also decreed to Mrs. Stanton.

FRENCH PRAIRIE PICNIC

Farmer's Annual Celebration at McCormick's Warehouse

Woodburn, May 28.—The annual French Prairie farmers' picnic was held today, at John McCormick's warehouse, two miles west of Woodburn. About 1000 people were present. Wm. Scollard and Father Leveque were masters of ceremonies. There was a basket dinner, a dance and athletic sports, and a sprinkling of politics. The principal speakers were P. H. D'Arcy, for the Democrats, and E. Hofer, for the Republicans. Wm. H. Egan and W. L. Tooez also talked. Col. Hofer denounced the provisions of the direct primary bill, and the local option bill. The former was declared revolutionary, and the latter mischievous, as Oregon had a better system of liquor laws today than Iowa, Kansas or Texas, and far less crime and more sobriety than those states that attempted prohibition.

There were splendid renditions of vocal and instrumental music, the singing by Mrs. John Miller, Miss Ramsby and the Misses Scollard and McCormick being especially fine.
