

WEEKLY CROP BULLETIN

Weather Conditions Have Not
|| Been Entirely Favorable
for Growth

The weekly crop bulletin says:

The past week has not been altogether favorable for the growing crops; the days were warmer than usual, but the nights were cool and several frosts occurred, but the damage done by them was slight, and confined principally to tender vegetables, such as beans, tomatoes, etc. Some fruit, however, was killed in the Grand Ronde valley and a few other localities east of the Cascade mountains. The rains early Tuesday morning occurred after the following reports were made. They were not only timely, but well distributed, and give promise of continuing for another day or so, in which case they will be sufficient for all needs and greatly stimulate the growth of late crops.

Late wheat is coming up to poor stands, and corn, potatoes and gardens are growing slowly. Forage crops, except timothy, are doing well, and the first crop of alfalfa is being harvested with satisfactory yields. Stock everywhere is in excellent condition. Fall wheat, barley and rye are heading nicely, and these crops are generally in a very promising condition, notwithstanding that some lowland wheat in Umatilla county was badly damaged by freezing weather earlier in the season. Hops are growing nicely, and the hopmen have now caught up with their work so that the yards generally are well cultivated.

Strawberries are ripe, and home-grown berries will be plentiful in the markets during the week. Apples have set well. Prunes will be light, but peaches, pears and cherries are turning out better than expected earlier in the season.

Salem Strawberries.

Secretary J. M. Kyle sold many crates of Salem berries yesterday at \$2.50 a crate. Some of the people not in the Union are, as usual, cutting prices, and some in the Union hastened to supply the cannery with enough to fill its contracts at less than could have been obtained. Secretary Kyle is making a hard fight for the Union to maintain prices, and deserves to be upheld by every member in his work.

STATE MILITIA ORDERED

in Ohio Town--Clash

Columbus, Ohio, June 1.—Governor Herrick today ordered state troops to Hanging Rock, Lawrence county, to preserve order at Hamilton Furnace, where serious clashes between the strikers and the colored strike-breakers have occurred. The sheriff telegraphed that the mob was parading the streets and were armed with Winchester and shotguns, and openly threatened violence and the destruction of property. PLANS LARGE MURDER

Turkish Reformer Claims
Sultan Will Obliterate
Armenians

Berlin, June 1.—Ali Nouri Pasha, a Turkish reformer, contributed several articles to the Volks Zeitung, in which he states that the Sultan of Turkey is planning great aid to the final massacre of Armenians, and the result will be the total annihilation of all Armenians in the Ottoman empire.

Must Make a Thousand.

Conneaut, O., June 1.—Arno Wolff Meyers is the name of a Rochester, N. Y., boy who arrived here last evening from Erie. He is here on a peculiar mission in that he found this town while on a trip from his home city to San Francisco on a wager made with G. H. Unsprung, a Rochester sporting man, the amount of the wager being \$100. The bet was made on May 8th, and the lad is required by the terms of it to get to his destination in one year, using any means of travel that he may see fit. He must earn his way and have \$1,000 in his possession by the time he reaches there. The bet was made after an argument between him and his companion, Jacob Simons, on the one side and the sporting man on the other. Simons, however, backed out on the morning they were to start on the journey. But Meyers had his nerve and is now well on the journey.

He visits the mayors of 411 of the towns that he reaches and gets their signatures to documents to show that he was there. He stopped at the Central house last evening and this morning visited Mayor Smith and secured his signature. He will proceed to Ashtabula this evening. He makes his money selling photographs of himself and doing odd jobs. He was formerly a sailor in the United States navy and was aboard the Topeka, but later did hospital service. He is attired in the navy hospital dress. He feels quite confident that he will succeed in his undertaking and should he travel at the rate he is now making per day will win the wager.

Mrs. Penland's Funeral.

The funeral of the late Mrs. J. H. Penland was held at the Leslie M. E. church yesterday afternoon, and was one of the largest attended funerals ever held in that church. Rev. Cliffe, of the First Baptist church, of which deceased was a devoted member, conducted the funeral services in a very impressive manner. A quartet of singers from the Baptist church, gave several selections, and the services were all very beautiful.

The church decorations were beautiful. Flowers were arranged in every available space at the altar, and the large quantity of floral offerings showed the love and respect in which she was held by all who knew her.

The services at the City View Cemetery were conducted in a very impressive manner. Mrs. Penland had many friends in the Capital City, and she will be greatly missed in many circles.

Socialist Candidate at Home.

B. F. Ramp, of this city, Socialist nominee for congress, has returned from a campaign of the southern part of the district. He made 17 speeches south of Salem, and spoke here yesterday, and at Fruitland last night. He reports good crowds at most of the places, and says that the indications for a large Socialist vote are very favorable. The Fruitland meeting filled the school house and was very enthusiastic.

Mr. Ramp goes to Newberg today, and will spend the rest of the week on the west side of the river. He says the total vote will be about normal, perhaps slightly in excess of that of last year.

Ed. Swope Dead.

Ed. A. Swope died yesterday at San Diego, California, aged 47 years, after an illness of several years, of tuberculosis. Deceased was well-known in Salem, where he was employed at various times in the state printing office. Several years ago he contracted the fatal disease, and has lived a greater portion of the last few years in California. He was a past master of Harmony lodge, A. F. & A. M., in Portland, and was well-known in Masonic circles. A brother, Wm. P. Swope, of Portland, survives him. The remains will be sent to Philadelphia for interment.

FORGER CAUGHT AT WORK

Fleeced Pendleton Merchant
and Says He Has Brother
in Polk County

Pendleton, Or., June 1.—One of the boldest attempts at swindling in the history of Pendleton was nipped in the bud yesterday morning, when "Captain" King, who says he belongs to the government geological survey, was placed under arrest, just as he was about to board the train for Portland.

On Monday King bought a bill of goods amounting to \$300 of F. S. Younger & Son, representing himself as a government employe in charge of reclamation work in progress in the Echo country, under the supervision of John T. Whistler. He said he wished to buy a bill of supplies for the camp, and after the purchase was concluded he gave the firm checks for \$9200 on the First National bank of Pendleton, signed by W. A. Trowbridge.

He assured the firm that Trowbridge was the government's special agent in charge of the funds for this district. Younger allowed him the goods, but could not cash the checks. The bank was closed Monday, a legal holiday. King asked for a small cash amount, and was given \$50. Yesterday King returned to the store, and said he would take the checks to the bank, cash them and return to pay Younger. He was given the checks, but failed to return.

Younger became suspicious, and telephoned the bank, only to find that there were no funds to Trowbridge's credit. The police were notified and caught King ready to take the train to Portland, a short time before noon. He could not make good, and was taken to jail. King has been in the city for a few days, presumably coming from the East.

King has confessed that the signing of Trowbridge's name to the checks was a forgery, and that Trowbridge is a fictitious person. He says he has a brother living at Independence, Or. He is 30 years old.
