them.

will not suffer by comparison.

A miner from Alaska who summered

and wintered with Jimmy Culver

several years in the Alaskan mines

says he is as brave a man as he wants

to see under any circumstances.

To summer and winter with a man

In that region, with all the dangers that beset men in the Klondike gold regions, is a pretty good test, and the miner is not a bad judge of performers under those circumstances.

Because Culver did not shoot down a Salem Democratic banker in a civil controversy over a line fence in the city of Salem, the Democrats argue he has not courage enough to be sheriff.

It should be recalled that he was not a police officer at that time and showed more sense than the man who wanted to settle the controversy with a club, if that was really ever undertaken.

Chances are Culver would have courage enough to do his duty without needless bloodshed, but would not hesitate to shoot if there was necessity.

DEMOCRATIC ATTACKS ON SCOTT.

The Democratic campaign managers are attacking Judge Scott because he has not furnished the steam road roller for the road that Governor Chamberlain is building to the Reform School.

The editor of this paper worked hard to get that road from the city to the Reform School undertaken by the Governor with convict labor.

So far as he knows Judge Scott and Governor Chamberlain have worked in perfect harmony to build that road and have had no disagreement whatever.

Several conferences were had between the head of the state government and the head of the county government and they have a perfect understanding as to what shall be done there.

Marion county Democratic campaign managers who never built a rod of road in their lives and who work nothing but politics would have the people believe that everything that Scott does is wrong.

They would blame him with all that is not done. If he did more they would attack him. If he did less they would attack him. That is politics at the hands of politicians.

Let us give both Chamberlain and Scott credit for what they are doing and trying to do for Good Roads. That is the only way to get results. Attacks for political effect always react in a candidate's favor.

THE MORALITY ARGUMENT.

There is nothing more catchy than to make an argument in a political campaign backed by an appeal that you are doing it for God and morality.

That is the greatest plea that is made for the Local Option law, so-called, which no Prohibitionist will deny is a Prohibition act.

But are God and morality always helped by these campaigns? God does not need the help of human laws, but morality requires legislation.

Admitting for the sake of argument and Local Option is good and desirable, will it be helped by a campaign on the God and morality plan?

The pulpits may have enough persuasive power to secure the adoption of this prohibitory law. But is that desirable for the churches?

If adopted next a campaign will have to be made to carry Marion county for Local Option and that will all have to be done in the churches.

If it carries, it will be clearly a church victory and no political party in power will feel responsible for adopting that plan of dealing with the evils of the liquor habit.

Then the work from the pulpits will have to be carried forward and a

ticket made up and a set of city and county officers put in who will carry out the Local Option policy.

If they succeed in electing such officials, the churches will be more or less responsible for the city and county government in all lines of public administration.

Now imagine that all they undertake is good and that they will succeed, is it desirable for their own standpoint that this be taken up? Do the churches on their own account want to go into politics?

Does not the God and morality argument take the churches, or at least some of them, into political turmoil, and will it not hamper their usefulness and weaken their influence over men in spiritual affairs?

As a friend of the Christian churches, can any sincere man or woman who wants to see morality and spirituality promoted uphold a campaign of, from and by the churches? Where will it all end but in church and state?

If you will not come to church and listen to our persuasion for making you good citizens we will make you moral by law and you shall be good citizens anyhow. We will unite church and state, they say.

The morality argument is plausible but specious, and leads to confusion of functions, that in all countries have been best kept entirely separate and that have never been united but to the weakening of both religion and government.

CHAMPIONS OF DISORDER.

The imported reverend gentlemen who are storming the churches for the local option law are in reality champions of disorder.

They are not permanent residents of any community, and know nothing about the difficulties the people would encounter under their proposed freak law.

These gentlemen are not taxpayers or producers. Many of them have not even a wife or children, are here to day and gone tomorrow.

They do not know that Oregon has better conditions and a better law, so far as the saloons are concerned, than most Eastern states.

They do not know that the city of Salem, for its size and location, has less saloons and less vice and crime and drunkenness than Eastern cities.

They do not know that the new charter of Greater Salem absolutely prohibits all saloons in the residence districts or the new wards.

They advocate a scheme, which, if carried in the county, would take away all power to regulate saloons or liquor traffic in this city.

They would sweep away all control and revenue, and leave the cities with unlicensed groggeries, run by the most disreputable class of people.

They may be ignorant of the actual conditions, and honestly advocate what they believe, but they would create disorder and promote lawlessness and drunkenness.

THE DEMOCRATS CLAIM IT ALL.

Of course Judge Scott and the Marion county court has not had a thing to do with getting Marion county out of debt.

So say the Democratic politicians. But the county is out of debt.

Of course the Republican county court has had nothing to do with reducing the county tax levies from eleven mills to four and three-tenths mills. The county tax just naturally reduced itself.

So say the Democratic politicians. But the county tax is reduced just the same.

The pauper expenses of the county have been reduced from \$7000 a year to \$3500 a year, but the Republican county court deserves no credit for that.

There is no way to prevent the politicians from claiming everything on earth. But the result is just as satisfactory to the taxpayers. They know who has produced these results.

A SENSIBLE COMMUNITY.

The little village of Medfield, Mass., the entire population of which would look lost in the Metropolitan Opera House says the New York Sun has the rare distinction of supporting four churches without ever having a church row.

There are Unitarians, orthodox Congregationalists, Baptists, and Catholics all living together in peace and harmony, but they have the good example set for them by the priest and the Protestant pastors, who have organized a clergyman's club, the principle rule of which is not to discuss differences of creeds. As the Unitarian minister, the Rev. John A. Savage, puts it:

"The four clergymen of this town have organized for several reasons, and I may say in the first place it is because we like one another personally and find it pleasant and interest-

ing to be together. But of course our main motive is a moral one.

"We wish to consult each other in the charitable and philanthropic endeavors of the community and we have in view especially the cause of temperance. In all this we feel the need of co-operation, companionship and of setting the example of sincere and open-hearted friendship before the people.

"As to our difference of opinion in religious matters, we frankly recognize the difference and shun all controversy."

The Rev. Father Hugh M. Smith, of the Catholic parish, says among other things:

"Our aim is to eliminate religious prejudice from among the people of the town, thus removing a formidable barrier to Christian union; to preserve in their hearts a warm charity and forbearance toward every other denomination of Christians, at the same time preserving themselves from the blight of religious indifference."

THE ROOSEVELT CHARACTER.

The true Roosevelt character is exemplified in the prompt and determined manner with which he is handling the Morocco bandits. Not a wait, not a hitch in the program, but a powerful demand upon the sultan of that semi-barbarous country for an enforcement of the laws. The leader of the bandits has received notice that he will be pursued and hanged if he murders the captives, and his proposition for an enormous bounty has been turned down. An imposing fleet of warships has entered Morocco waters and they stand ready to enforce every claim of our government.

Truly Roosevelt is an ideal American president and has astonished the world with his powerful administration of international affairs.

The sedate statesmen of Europe and even a few of our own wheedlers viewed with alarm the ascendancy of an untrained mind in diplomatic circles, and many grave fears were entertained for the world's peace. They reasoned that it was impossible for a great director to come from the common people.

Roosevelt has occupied the presidential chair nearly three years and yet every act has stamped him as a thorough diplomat and an able counselor. The world powers recognize in him one of the fearless rulers of today, and they respect him.

ABOUT SPRINKLING STREETS.

The Journal the other day had an article about the way State street was kept sprinkled under the Gilbert administration at the State Prison.

Supt. Gilbert got credit and justly for sprinkling the street from the prison down to 18th street.

This was a nice thing to say about the Gilbert administration, but Uncle Geo. Downing deserves a lot of credit in this matter.

He was the first Prison Supt. in our recollection to sprinkle the east end of State street.

He bought the sprinkler of W. D. Mohney, rigged up an old wagon and put on the sprinkling service at his own expense.

When Supt. Gilbert went in he made the incoming administration a present of the sprinkling outfit, and the good work went on.

The state furnished the water at the prison and the Water company furnished it at the city end, and for the last few years made a nominal charge.

Mr. Jones and Mr. Potter and others contributed to pay for the water and for many years the dust was kept off that street.

Supt. Lee for some reason did not sprinkle the street. The present Supt. of the Prison offers to sprinkle it with a little help.

The Journal believes the state institutions should sprinkle the street. The present streets about their property, as the dust is injurious to the property.

The streets about the State house, the court house, the city hall and Wilson avenue should be sprinkled at public expense.

The soft, mild winters, coupled with the delightful summers, an entire absence of thunder and lightning and other disagreeable and dangerous elements, make life a pleasure, as compared to the blizzard and storm-swept Eastern states. Back there it is one continual round of wind storms, hail storms, electric storms, water spouts, snow storms and a dozen other varieties. Oregon is surely the promised land.

Fact About the Panama Canal.

Estimated cost of the Panama Canal \$200,000,000.

Amount paid French company for the title, \$40,000,000.

Amount paid Panama government for perpetual lease of canal lands, \$10,000,000.

Length of canal, 46 miles.

Canal width varies from 250 feet to 500 feet at the top, the bottom width being 150 feet.

There will be five twin locks of concrete masonry, each lock 735 feet long and 82 feet wide, with a lifting capacity of 30 to 32 feet.

Lake Bohio (artificial) covers 31 square miles.

Alhajuela Lake (artificial) covers 5900 acres, and will furnish motive power for operating the locks and lighting the canal from ocean to ocean.

Distance from New York to San Francisco by old route, 13,714 miles; by the route through the canal, 5,299 miles.

Distance from New York to Manila by present route via San Francisco and Yokohama, 19,530 miles.

Distance from New York to Manila by Panama canal via San Francisco and Yokohama, 11,585 miles.

Distance saved in a sailing-trip around the world by the new route through the Panama canal, 2,768 miles.

The Panama canal was practically begun in 1883 by the French company. They had completed about two-fifths of the length, when because of fraudulent management the company failed, and the work ceased in 1889.—June Woman's Home Companion.
