LEMLEY RETIRES TODAY

Judge Advocate of the Navy
Who Conducted Schley
Court

Washington, D. C., June 3.—As a reward for the capable manner in which he represented the United States with the gunboat Marietta at La Guayra while the gunboats of England, Germany and Italy were blockading and bombarding the Venezuelan coast in December, 1902, Commander S. W. B. Diehl becomes judge advocate general of the navy in succession to Captain S. C. Lemley, whose term in that important position expired today.

The selection of Commander Diehl was somewhat of a surprise to naval circles as his name had never been mentioned in connection with the place. He had more of a reputation as an all around capable officer, with a specialty for compass work, than as a lawyer. He is the author of a standard work on the deviation of the compass needle.

During the Venezuela imbroglio the little Marietta was the only American warship in Venezuelan waters although Admiral Dewey, with an immense fleet, was not far away, at Culobra, Porto Rico. It looked for a time as if the aggressive tactics of the allies would render a show of force by the United States necessary. Commander Diehl won the confidence of the foreign commanders, although they were his seniors, and the navy department was convinced that his tact had much to do with keeping the United States safely out of the international complication.

Commander Diehl is of German descent and throughout his naval career, which begun when he was appointed to the naval academy in 1869 from Pennsylvania, he has been credited with cool judgment and great ability. He was assigned to duty in Washington in 1887 as Superintendent of Compasses and remained until 1889. He again performed that

duty in 1897-1898. Having served in the meantime on the Detroit, the Machias and the Cincinnati, he was engaged in special service on the Buffalo during the Spanish-American war and after the war he returned to Washington again as Superintendent of Compasses.

Captain Lemley, the retiring Judge Advocate general, was at the naval academy at the same time as Commander Diehl. He was born in North Carolina and was appointed to the academy from that state. He served on the Atlantic station from 1872 to 1876, on the Essex from 1876 to 1879, on the Palos from 1881 to 1883, and subsequently on the European station. He was appointed Judge Advocate-General of the navy 13 years ago. As judge advocate of the Schley court of inquiry Captain Lemley was much criticised by adherents of Rear Admiral Schley and was caricatured from one end of the country to the other, but his conduct of the case was regarded by the authorities as of a high order of excellence.

Southern Memorial Day.

Atlanta, Ga., June 3.—The anniversary of Jefferson Davis' birth was generally observed as Memorial day today throughout Georgia, Florida, Alabama and Louisiana. In Tennessee and Mississippi, by virtue of laws passed at the last legislative sessions the day was observed as a public holiday for the first time.

BELL AT WORLD'S FAIR

Old Liberty Leaves Home on
a Round About
Trip

Philadelphia, Pa., June 3.—Very largely in response to the patriotic appeal of the 75,000 school children of the City of St. Louis, the famous old Liberty Bell, which proclaimed "Liberty Throughout all the Land Unto all the Inhabitants Thereof," will leave Philadelphia tonight for St. Louis where it will be exhibited in the Pennsylvania building at the Louisiana Purchase Exposition. The historic relic will journey on a special car and during the entire period of its absence from the city it will be under the watchful eye of a squad of Quaker city policemen.

A round about route will be taken to St. Louis in order to give the people of a large section of the country an opportunity to see the bell. It was found impossible to accede to all the requests, but the itinerary as finally arranged provides for brief stops at a large number of places. Among the cities to be visited are Elmira, Rochester, Buffalo, Erie, Ashtabula, Cleveland, Sandusky and Toledo. From Chicago the route extends as far into the Northwest as Minneapolis and St. Paul, from which points the journey to St. Louis will be resumed by way of Dubuque, Rock Island, Peoria, and Springfield.

The present trip of the Liberty bell is the seventh time it has been out of Independence hall since it was first installed there in 1753. The first time it was removed was in 1777, when it was taken to Allentown, Pa., to prevent it falling into the hands of the British. There it remained until the British evacuated Philadelphia. All of its other journeys were for exhibition purposes, and included trips to New Orleans in 1885, to Chicago in 1893, to Atlanta in 1895, to Charleston in 1902, and to Boston in 1903.
