

ELECTION VERY QUIET

The Democratic Vote Is Reported Small

Republicans Carry the State and Elect Entire County Ticket

The Republican managers at Portland claim that the entire state ticket will be elected, including both congressmen. In Multnomah county the Republican ticket will be elected, excepting possibly Sanderson Reed, for district attorney, Manning, the Democratic candidate, getting a large Republican vote. For sheriff the vote between Stott, Rep., and Word, Dem., is said to be very close, while Nottingham for state senate, will probably defeat Courtenay, both Republicans. The Oregonian says: "The direct primary law and the state printer's amendment will probably be adopted. But the enactment of the local option bill is in doubt, and nobody can forecast the result. Even the most astute politicians are dubious."

Claims of the Democrats.
Alex. Sweek, chairman of the Democratic central committee said: "We shall have a stronger force in the state senate than last time," proclaimed Alex. "We shall elect Goucher in Yamhill, Tillamook and Lincoln; Koshow in Douglas; Hayter in Polk; Avery in Benton; Bennett in Wasco, and W. A. Booth in Crook, Klamath, Lake and Grant. We have a good

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chance to elect a senator in Union and Wallowa, and in Coos and Curry. Let's see, that makes eight senators, doesn't it?"

"Then for the lower house of the legislature we stand a good chance to elect one member in Douglas, three in Linn, two in Jackson, one in Benton and Lincoln, two in Union and Wallowa, three in Umatilla, one in Baker, one in Harney and Malheur, and one in Josephine. That makes 16 doesn't it?"

"As to the circuit judges, we shall re-elect Clifford, Bradshaw, Boise and Hamilton. We shall also elect Sam White, J. H. Raley and A. E. Reames district attorneys, and William Gallo way circuit judge."

Dr. Chas. T. Chamberlain and Dr. L. J. Wolf, of Portland, were in the city yesterday. The former is a son of Governor Geo. E. Chamberlain, and the latter is a native of Marion county, having been born at Silverton.

J. T. Woods, editor of the Springfield News was in the city yesterday. He says that his little city is growing very rapidly, and new industries are starting every day.
