EARLY MORNING FIRE

New York Business Houses Go up in Smoke—Loss Quarter of a Million

New York, June 6.—A fire this morning gutted the 7-story warehouse of McKesson & Co., the store of Robbins, druggist, and the building occupied by the Hoefer Wall Paper Company, Sperry & Hutchinson, and the United Merchants' Photograph association. The total loss is over \$250,000.

Odd Fellows at Tacoma.

Tacoma, Wash., June 6.—Tacoma has capitulated to an army of triple-linkers who will retain possession of the city for the next few days. The occasion is the annual meeting of the grand lodge of Odd Fellows, the grand encampment and the meeting of the Rebekahs. It is estimated that 1000 visitors are already here. Interesting programmes have been prepared for the several meetings. Among the speakers are Governor McBride, Mayor Wright and John B. Goodwin, grand sire of the sovereign grand lodge of the United States.

Would Fine Old Maids.

Mayor E. W. Sorber, of Gowrie, Ia., has taken a novel way of providing his town with funds for a library. He has announced his intention of fining every old maid or widow unless they take advantage of leap year and propose to some old bachelor or widower before the end of the present year. Gowrie has a population of something like 1000 inhabitants. Since this bright idea occurred to the mayor he has issued a proclamation, the conditions of which are that every woman of marriageable age, whether she has had any experience in married life or not, must take advantage of the rights afforded her by leap year and propose to some man of marriageable age who has not already taken unto himself a wife, or to be fined at the end of the year not less than one dollar nor more than five dollars. He himself is a bachelor, and he may be shy and diffident and unable to get his courage up to the proposing point, hence his decree, and he may live in hopes that fate will direct one of the fairest of the fair sex to storm the citadel of his heart, and he stands ready to surrender. He is treading on dangerous ground, if he only knew it, and there may come a day when he will wring his hands and strive to forget that he was ever the author of such an unheard of proclamation. There will be scores of bachelor maids as well who will cheerfully pay the fine for so worthy a cause for the privilege of moving on in the even tenor of their ways. They look around among their friends who have stepped out of the ranks of single blessedness and they find so many unhappy and discontented wives, so many of their friends married to the type of John P. Dunning that they can smile serenely to themselves and offer up a prayer of thanksgiving that they are not to be numbered among their more unfortunate sisters.
