SENSATIONAL DIVORCE CASE

Army Post Scandals Involving a Number of Officers and Persons Considered at Times to Constitute Good Society

San Francisco, June 6.—In anticipation of racy testimony Judge Hebbard's court room was crowded this morning when the divorce case of Captain Jerome Madden, of the United States Army, vs. Edith Madden was called, but all were disappointed, inasmuch as it was postponed at the request of the defense on the ground of an important witness being absent. It was set for August 29th.

This is the second chapter of one of the most sensational army post scandals that has ever invaded the dignified and exclusive circles of the war department. Unless all signs fall the names of many army post people, male and female, will be dragged into the case, already full of ramifications, and when the smoke clears away it is expected that several reputations will be badly in need of repairs.

The first chapter was written when Lieut. Hector Robichon, a handsome and dashing young officer was dismissed from the army, after a court martial had decreed that he was guilty of conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman. A party line telephone message from the Lieutenant to Mrs. Madden was overheard by the latter's mother-in-law, and the testimony of a post nurse who told of a visit to Robichon by Mrs. Madden, when Robichon was in the hospital were the basis for the finding.

Hardly had Robichon been stripped of his epaulettes when Captain Madden filed suit for divorce, naming the Lieutenant as co-respondent. Mrs. Madden soon followed with a cross-complaint, charging her husband with neglect and cruelty, non-support and infidelity, naming a number of white and native women in the Philippines. She charged him with being extremely filthy, of refusing to even send her a message of condolence when their first child died, of compelling her to remain in this country when he went to the Philippines, leaving her unprotected from the snares and temptations that fall in the path of a pretty woman, and that he so diverted his salary to other channels so as to leave her practically without funds.

It is not entirely the troubles of the Maddens, however, that will prove so diverting to the morbid, but the possibility of other and more startling domestic crashes. It is hinted that more

than one officer of high degree is in a very nervous and uneasy frame of mind, not knowing when he will be haled before a court-martial to answer embarrassing questions. Captain Madden has very little to say but it is generally understood that he will not spare the beautiful woman who bears his name, when her private life is dragged before the public and diligently searched for the indiscretions and misconduct that her husband accuses her of. On the other hand, Mrs. Madden is not backward in asserting that she is simply the unfortunate victim of a scheme hatched by officers of high rank to protect their own names from being smirched.

Rubichon's friends have consistently declared that the trouble was caused by personal spite of an officer of higher rank, who attempted to make love to Mrs. Madden. She repulsed him, but he was persistent, and it is charged that she was obliged to call upon Robichon for protection. Robichon and his superior officer had a violent quarrel, and Robichon's court-martial soon followed.

The army post people had hardly recovered from the shock that the Robichon trial and petition of Captain Madden gave them, when charges of conduct unbecoming an officer and a gentleman were preferred against Captain Houston Evans. They tore the post from center to circumference and the case was a hurried not to say a hurried scurry around to cover up tracks. The specific charges against Evans consisted of attempts on his part to make love to the wives of two lieutenant-colonels and the wives of officers of lower grade. Two of the complainants declared that he attempted to hug and kiss them. The captain made a complete denial of all charges and signified his intention to fight the case to the bitter end. The declaration, in addition to what is expected to develop in the Madden trial, are the source of grave concern according to post gossip to quite a number of persons.

The present trial threatens to be long drawn out, and if the promises of both sides are kept will develop a fresh sensation each day of the hearing. The defense has fine-combed the Philippines for evidence against the captain, and claims that it will be ready to spring testimony involving him with more than a score of women.

RUSSIA MEETS MORE REVERSES

part of last week, had another encounter Friday, June 3, near Chuchiatun. On that day the Japanese cavalry met the Russians at noon.

The Russians numbered 200 men and were composed of infantry, detachments of cavalry and artillery. They were pressing the Japanese cavalry, when the Japanese assembled their entire force and engaged the enemy. The Russians drew off gradually, and at 5:30 in the afternoon they retired to Telissu. The Japanese had four men killed and four men wounded in this fighting.

A report has been received here from General Kuroki saying that Friday last a detachment was dispatched from Ai Yang Cheng (Ai Yeng Pien Men), to the northeast of Feng Wang Cheng, to make a reconnaissance toward Chaihsai (Siatsai), 35 miles north of Feng Wang Cheng. This detachment encountered 600 Cossacks, and after a brisk engagement the Russians retreated.

General Kuroki reports that the Russian loss was heavy. The Japanese had one killed and three wounded.

Denver, June 6.—The supreme court today refused a writ of habeas corpus to Moyer, president of the Western Federation of Miners. It upheld Governor Peabody, in declaring martial law in San Miguel county, imprisoning Moyer and other unionists.
