ed for a great demonstration, parade, drill, or any out-of-door exercises or gatherings, because the weather may be relied upon for fully eight months in the year. Even on the way and before reaching San Francisco, the pilgrims will be met at the depots where the trains stop, and given an ovation. Committees will meet each incoming train on approaching the city by the Golden Gate and accompany the travelers to their destination. The escort on arrival at the depot by mounted and unmounted details of Sir Knights in uniform, with unfurled banners and bands of music, will be quite a feature. The city will be ablaze with lights that will make night brighter than midday. The decorations will surpass those of any city on the continent in attractiveness. The Grand Commandery of California will entertain at the Palace hotel, and California Commandery No. 1, together with other commanderies, will keep continuous open house in the Mechanics' pavilion, a structure that will accommodate 15,000 people. An exhibit of California's wealth, from valley and hills, mine and orchards, vineyards, forest and field, will be installed beneath the same roof. The entertainment will include free excursions on ocean liners around the bay of San Francisco, to all points of interest, and outside the heads as far as the Farallone islands, steaming around the Seal Rocks, the harbor fortifications, United States arsenal, naval training school, the great shipbuilding plants and famous ironworks; trolley rides to Golden Gate park, with its hundreds of acres in flowers at all seasons, its great conservatory, aviary, zoo, lake and the museum containing the rarest treasures on the American continent; the Sutro baths, the largest under a glass roof anywhere; the Cliff House, built on a perpendicular cliff overhanging the open beach of the Pacific ocean. All these are free to all visitors. Chinatown, a real part of the celestial empire, right in the heart of an American city; the offices, press room and editorial department of the only Chinese newspaper published outside of China; nightly performances of a troop of celestial actors and a Chinese orchestra, and one thousand and one other novel sights, startling to the visitor, but common to California. Peel Bark for a Living.
Chehalis, Wash., June 7.—Lewis county is becoming quite a center for

the cascara bark business. At the present time peeling is in full blast, and many of the ranchers are peeling the bark on their places. Owing to the dullness of the lumber business many people formerly employed in the mills and lumber camps have gone into the woods and are peeling bark for a little grubstake this fall. A year ago there were not half a dozen men in the county engaged in the business of peeling the bark, while today it is estimated that between 200 and 300 men and boys are engaged in the business, mostly in a small way. One or two firms have bought up a large acreage of the bark, and have a number of men peeling for them. These firms are not on the market with their bark, however, and will hold for the rise in price that they expect will come in the next year or two. So far very little of the bark has been sold, but where sales have been made the price ranges all the way from 3 to 8 cents.

American Medical Association.
Atlantic City, N. J., June 7.—Beginning today with the opening of the 55th annual session of the American Medical Association, this resort for the next few days will be the central point for medical men from all over the United States and Canada, as, in addition to the above, there will be meetings of state and provincial health officials, licensing boards and other bodies. Interesting programs have been prepared for the meetings. While the discussion and papers will be largely technical they will be of considerable importance to the general public, as well as to the medical fraternity.

Rumor of Another Battle.
Chee Foo, June 6.—A Japanese correspondent from Dalny confirms the reported advance of the Japanese army on Port Arthur, news of which was brought here today by the Chinese. The correspondent states, however, that there are 15 miles between the Japanese and Port Arthur, instead of seven, as reported by the Chinese. The Japanese army is advancing along both coasts. It is reported that the peninsular division on the east coast fought a battle within 15 miles of Port Arthur, June 3d. The result of the battle has not yet been learned.
