EDDY SUFFERS DEFEAT

Returns From All Counties
Point to Election of Gal-
loway

Unofficial reports from every county
in the district indicate the defeat of
B. L. Eddy, for circuit judge, and the
election of Wm. Galloway, of Mc-
Minnville.

The counties in the district carried
by Galloway over Eddy are: Yamhill
(unofficial) 450; Linn (unofficial)
200; Polk, (official 86; Tillamook, (of-
ficial) 35. Total 771. Eddy carried
Marion county, according to the un-
official returns, by 698, leaving Gal-
loway a majority of 63. It may re-
quire the complete official canvass to
decide the election.

Believe That Patterson Wo-
man Attempted to Kill
Herself

New York, June 7.—Caesar Young
was buried today at the Konaico
cemetery. Nan Patterson still lan-
guishes in jail, the coroner having re-
fused a release for \$5000 bail previ-
ously fixed. Counsel for the Patterson
woman this morning applied before
Justice Clark, of the supreme court,
for a writ of habeas corpus, but the
representation that the district at-
torney had not time to prepare it, ad-
journment was taken until afternoon.
Nan Patterson was brought into court
garbed entirely in black with a heavy
veil. She had regained her compos-
ure. A new theory of Young's death
is that the woman attempted suicide
because Young was about to leave her,
and in the struggle for possession of
the pistol he was killed.

Rioting at Victor.

Rioting broke out in this city this
afternoon, while a mass meeting was
being held to discuss the murder of
13 non-union miners by means of an
infernal machine at Independence. For-
ty shots were fired into a crowd in the
street. One man was killed, another
died in the hospital, and eight persons,
at least, injured.

cape of unionists. No distinction is

includes every man known to carry
a union card. Over 1000 armed men,
under the newly appointed sheriff,
are searching the towns in the hills
district for members of the Western
Federation of Miners.

Martial Law Declared.

Denver, June 7.—Acting Governor
Haggett this afternoon announced
that he would declare martial law in
Teller county before night, and order
troops to that camp. The latest report
from Cripple Creek are that wholesale
resignations have been demanded
from public officers by the mine own-
ers' association, and that City Mar-
shal Graham has already retired.
Others, who were asked to go to go,
are Assistant District Attorney Cole,
County Judge Frost, County Clerk and
Recorder Mannix and Justice Har-
rington.
