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SALEM FEELS FIRST EFFECT LOCAL OPTION

Every Saloon Man Arrested Wednesday Morning for Keeping Open on Sunday

Prof. W. P. Drew of the Anti-Saloon League Makes the Complaints—More Arrests Likely to Follow

Prof. W. P. Drew, one of the faculty in Willamette University, at a late hour last evening swore out complaints in Justice Horgan's court against every saloon keeper in Salem for selling liquor on Sunday, June 5th. The warrants were served by Constable Lewis this morning, and the defendants appeared before the court, and asked for time to plead. The defendants are J. P. Rogers, four charges, F. P. Talkington, E. Eckerlen, Mel Hamilton, Jos. Tyler, Wm. Anderson, Butte & Wederoth, Bach & Natsanek, Nusbaum Bros., Alex. Corroyer, A. Scribner and John Cooper. It is the intention of the saloonmen to make a hard fight, and in each case get a jury trial. One of the men, in talking this morning, said: "We believe that the Anti-Saloon League is commencing a campaign of persecution against the liquor dealers in the state. The saloons of this city are orderly, and the proprietors and their men enforce the general laws of the state. We will make a determined stand against such intolerance, and so do not propose to submit meekly to their hounding."

A Journal reporter called on Prof. Drew this afternoon and was informed by that gentleman that all cases would be prosecuted to the full extent. "We have plenty of evidence," said he, "and we will not rest until all are punished." The doors of the saloons were wide open during the time the excursionists were in town, and dozens of people can be called to testify.

The wholesale arrests are probably the outcome of the victory of the local optionists in the state last Monday. It is known that several members of the Anti-Saloon League were keeping a close tab on the saloon on election day, and at one place caught one or two men inside the barroom. It is said that other arrests will follow.

The time for the trial of the defendants has not been fixed, but will be set for some time tomorrow at the court house. The cases are attracting great attention throughout the city, and will be watched with considerable interest.

GOMPERS PRETTY ANGRY

Denounces the Action of Colorado Governor in Dealing With Labor Troubles

Washington, June 8.—Samuel Gompers denounces in vigorous terms the action of the Colorado authorities for their methods in dealing with the labor troubles of that state. He says the governor is the one man above all others who is responsible for the reign of terror now prevailing in Cripple Creek district, and characterizes him as a flippant violator of the civil law, and a human rights. Gompers said that he could not conceive the outrage was the work of any organized body of men, much less a prearranged plan of body of miners, but must have been that of individuals. The Citizens' Alliance he determined as a body of capitalistic anarchists.

FIVE ROBBERS BOLD

They Held up a Train and Captured Sack of Gold

Denver, June 8.—The was bound Denver & Rio Grande passenger train, which left here on Tuesday morning, was held up near Palisade, east of Grand Junction, at an early hour this morning. Brakeman Shellenberger was seriously wounded as a result of a bullet from the gun of the hold-up, and the conductor had his lantern shot from his hand. The robbers flagged the train two miles from the station, and two masked men marched the conductor back to the train and detached the engine and express car from the coaches. They blew up the safe, after running the locomotive and cars some distance up the track. The express officials claim that the amount obtained was very small.

Denver, June 8.—The scene of the hold-up was five miles west of Parachute, a small fruit station on the western slope. Five men were concerned. Two boarded the blind baggage at Parachute, crawled over the tender, and covered Engineer Allison, and ordered the train stopped. The engine, baggage and express car were uncoupled, and run down the track two miles, where three confederates were stationed. Messenger Shea, refusing to open the car, the doors were blown in with dynamite. Shea was forced to open the safe. The robbers secured one sealed bag from Salda, said to contain gold, and fled. Two posers are in pursuit.

PORT ARTHUR HAS FALLEN

Two Telegrams to That Effect—The Japanese Loss Was Heavy

London, May 8.—The St. James Gazette says a rumor is current on the stock exchange today that Port Arthur had fallen but it cannot be confirmed.

London, May 8.—The Exchange Telegraph company also reports the rumor of the fall of Port Arthur with a Japanese loss of 11,000.

Long Line of Trenches.

Chee Foo, June 8.—A dispatch states that the Japanese forces occupy a semi-circular line 24 miles long, near Port Arthur, and are busy mounting heavy guns on the neighboring heights.

Gunboats Were in Fight.

St. Petersburg, June 8.—Viceroy Alexieff today reports that Rear-Admiral Wilgert praises the gunboat Bobr, and its valiant crew, which strongly supported our right flank in the battle of Kinchou. He was also aided by the torpedo boats Baurin and Boyky. He further reports that on May 28th, 10 torpedo boats were sent out against the Japanese, and while returning one struck on the rocks and sank, but the crew were saved.

Rumors Are Persistent.

Rome, June 8.—A Yinkow dispatch today asserts that the attack on Port Arthur has been proceeding on both land and sea since last Saturday, and that the fall of the fortress is imminent.

Gunboats Prospected.

Tokio, June 8.—Four Japanese gunboats made a close reconnaissance off Port Arthur on Monday, for the purpose of examining the entrance to the harbor. They were exposed to a severe fire from the forts and gunboat No. 4 was hit eight times, and sustained some damage. One sailor was killed and one wounded.

Bull Fighter Killed.

St. Louis, June 8.—Mannel Cevera, the champion bull fighter of Spain, was shot and killed in his room at Mozart Flats by Captain Carlton Bass, a matador, shortly before noon today. It is alleged that the murder grew out of trouble over salaries, as both belonged to the company brought here by the Morris Amusement Company, whose bull ring was burned by a mob on Sunday. Bass surrendered, and five other bull fighters were arrested. Bass declared that he killed Cevera in self-defense.

Captives Will Be Released.

Paris, June 8.—Semi-official advices today state that negotiations for the release of Perleard and Varley by the Moroccan brigands is proceeding encouragingly, owing to the action taken by Chief Cuzan, the protege of France.

For a Higher Education.

St. Petersburg, June 8.—The Novie Vremia prints an editorial today urging the improvement in education of the Russian masses. The article is creating a great sensation.

Coal Mine Explosion.

Madrid, June 28.—Twenty-five were killed in an explosion at a colliery near Melenderos this morning.

Lands Troops at Tangier.

Washington, June 8.—Admiral Chadwick cables that he landed a force of marines at Tangier to protect the Belgian legation, at the request of the consul-general, who also cables to the British consul at Fez that he understands the sultan of Morocco has granted the demands of the brigands for the release of Perleard and Varley.

Kentucky Not Instructed.

Louisville, Ky., June 8.—The Kentucky state Democratic convention is in session here today, and an uninstructed delegation will probably go to the St. Louis convention. The fight is over the control of the state central committee.
